


# The Space Between Us, by Thrity Umrigar


### Mudbound, by Hillary Jordan


and frightening. In the midst of the family's struggles, two young men return from the war to work the land. Laura's

brother-in-law is everything her husband is notcharming, handsome, and haunted by his memories of combat. Ronsel Jackson, eldest son of the black sharecroppers who live on the McAllan farm, has come home with the shine of a war hero. But no mat-

ter his bravery in defense of his country, he is still considered less than a man in the Jim Crow South. It is the unlikely friendship of these brothers-in-arms that drives this powerful novel to its inexorable conclusion.



Set in South Carolina in 1964, The Secret Life of Bees tells the story of Lily Owens, whose life has



been shaped around the blurred memory of the afternoon her mother was killed. When Lily's fiercehearted "stand-in mother," Rosaleen, insults three of the town's fiercest racists, Lily decides they should both escape to the town that holds the secret to her mother's past. There they are taken in by an eccentric trio of black beekeeping sisters who introduce Lily to a mesmerizing world of bees, honey, and the Black Madonna who presides over their household. This is

a remarkable story about divine female power and the transforming power of love--a story that women will share and pass on to their daughters for years to come.
