Ten Reasons for the Decline of the Evening News - December 2

The Camden Conference presents Peter Imber at the Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, December 2 at 6:00 p.m. to discuss *Ten Reasons for the Decline of the Evening News*.



Fifty years ago, at the height of his popularity as "the most trusted man in America," Walter Cronkite and the CBS Evening News averaged nearly 30 million viewers a night. Today, the three major network television evening news broadcasts have a combined audience every night that is half of that.

How this happened will be the focus of Imber's discussion, which will examine the history of TV news, the impact of technology, the influence of corporate control of the networks, the rise of cable news and the growth of social media as a news source.

Peter Imber worked in the ABC News Los Angeles Bureau for 26 years as a producer for ABC News' broadcasts, including World News Tonight with Peter Jennings and Nightline with Ted Koppel.

During his career he covered the Los Angeles riots in the wake of the Rodney King beating, the O.J. Simpson trial, the Columbine school shooting and other major news stories.

His work was nominated for National News Emmys four times, winning once, and he has received a DuPont-Columbia Award and a National Press Club Award.

Imber graduated from Dartmouth College and lived on a kibbutz in Israel for seven years in the 1970s and served in the Israeli army. He retired to Maine in 2010 and is a past president of the Camden Conference.



Adult Book Discussion - December 3

Join us on Tuesday, December 3 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Sation Eleven* by Emily St. John Mandel.

"Few themes are as played-out as that of post-apocalypse, but St. John Mandel (The Lola Quartet) finds a unique point of departure from which to examine civilization's wreckage, beginning with a performance of King Lear cut short by the onstage death of its lead, Arthur Leander, from an apparent heart attack. On hand are an aspiring paramedic, Jeevan Chaudary, and a young actress, Kirsten Raymonde; Leander's is only the first death they will witness, as a pandemic, the so-called Georgia Flu, quickly wipes out all but a few pockets of civilization. Twenty years later, Kirsten, now a member of a musical theater troupe, travels through a wasteland inhabited by a dangerous prophet and his followers. Guided only by the graphic novel called Station Eleven given to her by Leander before his death, she sets off on an arduous journey toward the Museum of Civilization, which is housed in a disused airport terminal. Kirsten is



not the only survivor with a curious link to the actor: the story explores Jeevan's past as an entertainment journalist and, in a series of flashbacks, his role in Leander's decline. Also joining the cast are Leander's first wife, Miranda, who is the artist behind Station Eleven, and his best friend, 70-year-old Clark Thompson, who tends to the terminal settlement Kirsten is seeking. With its wild fusion of celebrity gossip and grim future, this book shouldn't work nearly so well, but St. John Mandel's examination of the connections between individuals with disparate destinies makes a case for the worth of even a single life." (Publishers Weekly, vol 261, issue 25)

experiences and questions about social isolation. Please stay tuned for upcoming dates.


Round table workshops are presented by the Center for Social Isolation Remedies (socialisolation.org) in conjunction with the Kennebunk Free Library.

She was married to renowned Magnum Photographer Dennis Stock who died in 2013. She currently lives in Kennebunkport with two pugs.

Nonfiction Book Group - December 9

Join us on Monday, December 9 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Monk of Mokha* by Dave Eggers.

"Eggers (Heroes of the Frontier) tells the exciting true story of a Yemeni-American man's attempts to promote his ancestral country's heritage, giving both a timely gloss on the traditional American dream and a window into the nightmare of contemporary political instability. The book first finds Mokhtar Alkhanshali as an ambitious but unfocused 25-year-old who has held a series of odd jobs in the Bay Area-including as a car salesman and doorman. He finds unexpected direction in 2013, when he learns that coffee originated 500-years earlier in his family's native country, under the oversight of the titular



Sufi holy man. This revelation sends him on an entrepreneurial quest to revitalize the long-

dormant Yemeni coffee industry. Alkhanshali's education in the coffee business provides a fascinating glimpse at how coffee is grown and processed today, but his path takes a startling turn in 2015 when Alkhanshali visits Yemen to make final importing arrangements just as the country collapses into civil war. The narrative turns into an increasingly surreal account of Alkhanshali's efforts to elude imprisonment and even death in order to get the coffee-bean samples he has secured back to America. Eggers's book works as both a heartwarming success story with a winning central character and an account of real-life adventures that read with the vividness of fiction." (Publishers Weekly, vol 264, issue 44)

Regulating the Media: Signposts - December 10


The Camden Conference Presents Sylvia Kraemer at the Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, December 10 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss "Regulating the Media: Signposts."

Sylvia Kraemer honed her talent for navigating technological change through the shoals of public policy at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). There she served in various policy development capacities during a 20-year career, culminating in representing NASA during the formulation of the Clinton administration's National Space Policy (1996).

She began her career at NASA in 1983 as Chief Historian, following a decade of teaching history at Vassar College, Southern Methodist University, and the University of Maine, Orono. She received her doctorate in history from the Johns Hopkins University. Sylvia is the author of numerous articles and three books on history, technology, and public policy: *The Urban Idea in Colonial America* (1977), *NASA Engineers and the Age of Apollo* (1992), and *Science and Technology Policy in the United States: Open Systems in Action* (2006).


using sharp tools. Space is limited and registration and a waiver are required. Call or stop by to register! This program will be held in Hank's Room.

Indigenous Reads - December 17 (at KFL)

The Wells Public Library and the Kennebunk Free Library are partnering to offer a book group featuring books written by authors of Indigenous heritage. The group will meet on the third Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m., with the location alternating between the two libraries.

On December 17, we will discuss *The Heartbeat of Wounded Knee* by David Truer at the Kennebunk Free Library.

"Ojibwe novelist and nonfiction author Treuer (Prudence) offers a counter-narrative to the same old sad story of the 'dead Indian' in this forceful, full-scale history of the Native American experience. The book 's title references Dee Brown's 1970 bestseller,



Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee, and its claim that, between 1860 and 1890, "the culture and civilization of the American Indian was destroyed." Aiming to recast how Native Americans see themselves as well as how they're viewed by others, Treuer briskly chronicles the first four centuries of contact between Europeans and American Indians before taking a deep dive into the "untold story of the past 128 years." He documents Native American heroism in WWI; the 1934 Indian Reorganization Act, which brought New Deal reforms to tribal communities; the post-WWII urban migration of Native Americans; the 1970s occupations of Alcatraz Island and the Bureau of Indian Affairs by members of the American Indian Movement; and the impact of legalized gambling on reservation life. Interwoven with these accounts are profiles of Treuer's friends and family, and reportage from "Indian homelands" throughout the U.S. His character sketches, of Oglala Lakota chef and cookbook author Sean Sherman, for example, are impactful and finely drawn. This vivid rewriting of the history of Native America should be required reading." (Publishers Weekly, vol 266, issue 44)


Drop-In Winter Crafts - December 12

December Artist: Gerald and Linda Stone

The Kennebunk Free Library announces its exhibit for December 2019, **A Time**Remembered: Pictures and Drawings of the Past the works of Gerald and Linda Stone. The public is invited to view the exhibit December 3 to 30 during regular library hours when the gallery is not in use for library programs.

Gerald was born in Dover, NH. Thanks to his father, Gerald's art education started with discipline: work on art before going outside to play ball. You have to keep at it to improve. Through High School he loved drawing sports figures. UNH mechanical drawing classes led to working as a draftsman for architectural and engineering firms. Later in life, Gerald owned The Stone Sign Shop, designing and building signs, hand lettering vehicles and working in gold leaf. Many of the signs are still in use. This work was enjoyable but he has returned to the freedom of pastel. watercolor and pen and ink. "Living in Portsmouth, NH where you are surrounded by history, planes, ships, submarines,



beautiful beaches and ocean give me so many subjects to draw and paint."

Linda's art education started with her father too. He was a carpenter who became blind but continued working with wood. Linda helped him by cutting wood with a bandsaw. "That began my love for wood and creating. In 1990 I began designing primitive art. I didn't start painting until retirement in 2012. I love the beauty and lines of automobiles. I also love antiques. It was an easy choice to paint these old cars and trucks abandoned in the fields and beside old barns. After visiting the automobile museum in Boothbay Harbor, I decided to add antique auto accessories like oil cans, gas pumps and garage signs to my art objects."

Together Linda and Gerald inspire each other to put in the time and improve. Whatever they paint, they find peace in comfort in it, encouraging each other to "dare to share" their work with others.

The public is invited to an artist's reception on Friday, December 6th from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. Kennebunk Free Library is pleased to display the works of these talented artists.

Library News & Events

What's the Commotion at KFL?

In the last few weeks, you may have noticed a lot going on at KFL. Maybe you drove by and saw the giant blue tarp draped over the building. Maybe you were looking for your favorite holiday movie and stumbled into the scaffolding that covered the shelf where the DVDs used to be. So what's been going on?

Our first big project this month was replacing the roof. It was last shingled during the 1994 expansion so it was at the very end of its expected life span. A couple of significant windstorms in the last year ripped off shingles, causing leaks and making it clear that roof replacement could not wait. Happily, the project was completed quickly and well. We are looking forward to staying warm and dry this winter!

The scaffolding that is currently dominating the landscape in the adult services area is the result of another major project - repairing a damaged portion of the 1907 decorative plaster ceiling. More than a century of extreme temperatures and intermittent water damage took their toll. A small piece of the ceiling fell over the summer. We hired an experienced plasterer to repair the damage to good-as-new condition and ensure that the ceiling is safe. The plaster work takes about a week to complete. However, the scaffolding will remain up for about three more weeks. The plaster goes on very wet and takes a long time to dry. When it has set, the plasterer will come back and paint the restored area to match the rest of the ceiling.

We hope that with the right care, the library will be just as beautiful in another hundred years as it is now. We appreciate your patience with the work that goes into making that happen.


