Brexit at 5: How Is It Going? - December 7



The Camden Conference and the Kennebunk Free Library present Andrea Stanley Hester at the Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, December 7 at 6:00 for "Brexit at 5: How Is It Going?"

Five years ago, the people of the United Kingdom voted by a slim majority to leave the European Union, the first time any country had ever done so. This decision, which shocked the world, ushered in a period

of intense economic, social, and political upheaval that still reverberates today. Even though PM Boris Johnson promised to "Get Brexit Done," the truth is that in many ways Brexit has only just begun. In this talk, Andrea Hester will discuss what happened in the aftermath of the referendum and examine some of the most pressing issues that remain today, including disputes over fishing rights, Scottish independence, and the Northern Ireland Protocol.

Andrea Stanley Hester is Vice President of the World Affairs Council of Maine, an instructor at the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at the University of Southern Maine, and President of the Harvard Club in Maine. In her previous career, she was an editor/writer for the President of Harvard University and administrator of the International Visitors Program in the Office of the University Marshal at Harvard. She has a bachelor's degree in modern European history from Tufts University and a Master's degree in Government from the Harvard University Extension School. Andrea and her husband reside in North Yarmouth with their two daughters.

Night Sky Presentation: December 9





Herrick-Gleason will be "exploring" a virtual night sky and presenting a short show entitled "Aurora Storm" during this session. He will also be answering your astronomy questions.

Edward Herrick-Gleason is the director of the Southworth Planetarium at the University of Southern Maine. He has worked

as Manager of the Southworth Planetarium since 1999 and became Director in 2020. Herrick-Gleason also teaches astronomy classes and writes the blog "The Daily Astronomer."

Nonfiction Book Group - December 13


"Psychology professor Kahneman (Thinking, Fast and Slow), business professor Sibony (You're About to Make a Terrible Mistake!), and legal scholar Sunstein (Too Much Information) team up for this fascinating exploration of the bias and 'noise' that cause errors in human judgment. Noise, they write, is 'variability in judgments that should be identical' that, when combined with one's own biases —conscious or not — can cause human error. The authors offer no shortage of noise-reduction strategies: 'decision hygiene,' for example, involves sequencing information to cut back on the possibility of

confirmation bias, a technique used in forensic science analyses, where examiners get 'only the information they need when they need it.' The authors also suggest breaking down complex decisions into 'multiple fact-based assessments'; avoiding group discussions, which increase noise, instead collecting individual opinions beforehand; and appointing a 'decision observer' to identify bias. Though the writing can be jargon-heavy, readers will find plenty of insight and useful exercises. The result is dense and complex, but those who stay the course will be rewarded with an intricate examination of decision-making and sound judgment." (Publishers Weekly, vol 268, issue 11)

Adult Book Discussion - December 14

"New York, 1911. Coralie Sardie works for her father, the



'professor' and impresario of the Museum of Extraordinary Things, a freak show in Coney Island. She performs as a mermaid in a tank but really lives for her long swims in the cold Hudson River. While Coralie's element is water, Eddie Cohen is tormented by fire. He fled a fiery pogrom in his native Russia and now wants to break away from his miserable life on the Lower East Side and become a photographer. Eddie's hatred of rich factory owners increases when he takes photos of the ghastly fire at the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory in Greenwich Village. Meanwhile, Professor Sardie grows even more sinister as the crowds desert his 'museum' for the new and lavish amusement palaces of Luna Park and Dreamland. Then Coralie and Eddie get caught up in the chaos as Dreamland burns to the

ground. With a sprinkling of magical realism, Hoffman blends social realism, historical fiction, romance, and mystery in a fast-paced and dramatic novel filled with colorful characters and vivid scenes of life in New York more than a century ago." (Library Journal, vol 139, issue 1, p 98)

Climate Politics in Contemporary Europe - December 15



The Camden Conference and the Kennebunk Free Library present Dr. Susana Hancock at the Kennebunk Free Library on Wednesday, December 15 at 6:00. Dr. Hancock will be discussing *Climate Politics in Contemporary Europe*.

Dr. Susana Hancock is a specialist in Arctic climate geopolitics. With a background ranging from astrophysics to linguistics, she is a recent three-degree

graduate of the University of Oxford. Originally from Maine, she has worked and lived in the polar regions for much of her life. Currently, Susana is an Expert Reviewer for the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, is on the Executive Committee of the Association for Polar Early Career Scientists where she works on climate and science diplomacy, and has been an Arctic consultant for the UN's Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission. She has just returned from COP26 in Glasgow and the UN in Geneva, where she was an invited speaker on Arctic environmental geopolitics and on cognitive linguistics in climate communication. In her other life, she is an elite rower who has competed around the world and qualified for the 2016 Olympic trials and currently coaches at Waynflete School.

The Museum of Extraordinary Things by Alice Hoffman

KFL's Adult Book Group will be discussing this book December 14 at 1 p.m. This work of historical fiction is set on Coney Island in 1911. The same year as the Triangle Shirt factory fire and the workforce unrest surrounding it. It is a story of love, romance, misunderstandings, kindness, cruelty and the abuse of power. Strong characters, well fleshed out make you feel that you know them. Even the animals become your friends. I loved this book and when I finished listening to it, I started it all over again.

A Christmas Tale a film by Arnaud Desplechin (French with English Subtitles)

Take a Holiday ride with Catherine Deneuve as Junon, the matriarch of the troubled

Vuillard family, who gather at Christmas after she learns she needs a bone marrow donor. This thoroughly messed up reunion will feel like a roller coaster ride. Roger Ebert says "A Christmas Tale" skates on thin ice across a crowded lake, arrives safely on the far shore, and shares a cup of hot cocoa and marshmallows with death". Very quirky and completely held my attention from the start.

Chasing Monarchs - Migrating with the Butterflies of Passage by Robert Michael Pyle

This summer I had a small patch of milkweed with a bumper crop of Monarchs! I had a wonderful time from tiny larva, to all fattened up ready for pupa stage and busting out as a fresh, perfect butterfly. This book goes monarch big scale, by traveling and tracking them down as they migrate from Canada to Mexico. The author is one of America's exceptional naturalists and he includes tidbits about all kinds of flora and fauna, as well as the effects of climate change on various environments in this travel adventure.
