Library News and Events



Last year, we announced the completion of a digitization project of three of our historic newspaper collections. We are exceedingly pleased to

announce that we have completed digitizing a fourth set! Our holdings of the *Kennebunk Gazette* are now freely available online for downloading, searching, and reading. The *Kennebunk Gazette* is the second oldest publication in our newspaper collection, spanning 1822 – 1842. The physical papers have been maintained in storage for nearly three decades with limited public access due to concerns with the fragile condition of the paper. With digitization complete, the original issues' content is now perpetually preserved and available for unlimited online access. We are grateful to the Maine Humanities Council who provided KFL with a grant to conduct this project, and to our scanning and hosting partners at the Osher Map Library and the Maine State Library for helping us preserve 200 years of local history.

We invite you to explore these issues where you will find reporting on major national events such as the death and funeral of John Adams, local and state news coverage including the Aroostook Boundary War and reports on a sea-serpent plying the York County coast, social events, ship arrivals, advertisements, poetry and literature, and reports of interest from around the country and the globe. Each issue is keyword searchable for ease of research. Do note that the text on each page is small and dense, thus making the files large. Please exercise patience while these treasures load on your computers. You can find the collection at <https://digitalmaine.com/kennebunk> alongside the Andrew Walker Diaries, the *Kennebunk Enterprise*, the *Seaside Echo*, and the *Wave* newspapers. We hope you enjoy this peek into history as much as we do.

BewilderBeasts podcaster Melissa McCue-McGrath - December 6



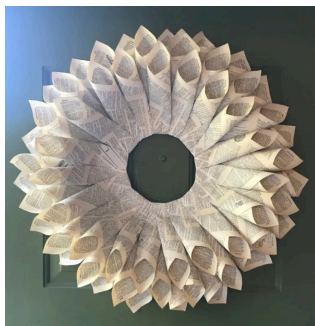
Animals intersect with humanity in infinite ways. That's the premise of local dog trainer, Melissa McCue-McGrath's podcast, *BewilderBeasts*. On Tuesday, December 6 at 6:30 p.m., Melissa will be at Kennebunk Free Library to introduce us to animals who do unusual jobs for humans, including goats who prevent forest fires in California, bees who are trained to find landmines in Croatia, and dogs who find whale poop to help scientists save orcas! There will also be a discussion about the often misunderstood job descriptions between service dogs, emotional support animals, and therapy dogs. So, if you are curious about

all the animals who work for humans, come and listen to this free presentation of *BewilderBeasts*. This is appropriate for kids and adults of all ages, so bring your curiosity!

Melissa McCue-McGrath, CPDT-KA, grew up in what she considers an "accidental dog sledding family" in Washington, ME, before working with pet dogs in urban centers. She spent 18 years training dogs and working difficult behavior cases in Boston, where she wrote her first book, *Considerations for the City Dog*, the first training book that keeps the challenges of working with pet dogs in busy environments in mind. In 2020, she started the podcast *BewilderBeasts* to help keep kids interested in science and history through an animal lens which is now heard all over the world. Melissa continues training dogs at the Animal Welfare Society, including sports classes, in Kennebunk, and she remains

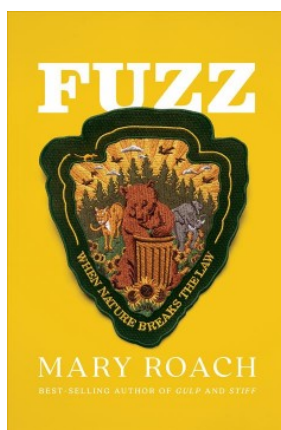
the VP of the New England Dog Training Club in Boston, the oldest AKC affiliated dog obedience club in the country.

Nonfiction Book Group - December 12



Join us on Monday, December 12 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Fuzz* by Mary Roach.

"The expert on quirky science writing doesn't disappoint. In Roach's (*Grunt*; *Gulp*; *Stiff*) newest book, she brings readers on her journey into the realm of human-wildlife conflict. Roach's writing combines research with firsthand experience, plus tips for handling an unplanned encounter with a wild animal. She observes and talks with international laypeople and specialists across many fields, such as animal-attack forensics investigators. Her natural curiosity and wit pair well with her topics, including her harassment by monkeys, and the way emus and albatrosses outsmarted the Australian and U.S. militaries, respectively. She gets elbow-deep in crime scenes

with furry suspects and travels to India to investigate the high rate of deaths by elephant. Roach also explores how politics, climate change, and religion can complicate human-wildlife interactions worldwide. Like Roach's previous best-selling pop science works, this book is unpretentious and honest about what she sees and what she learns along the way. VERDICT A must-read for wildlife enthusiasts, popular science readers, and anyone who has enjoyed Roach's other books. Her occasionally awkward interactions with people and animals make for the engaging narrative style that Roach is famous for." (Library Journal, vol 146, issue 7, p91)

stop by Kennebunk Free Library for *A Gathering of Celtic and Christmas* – songs and stories by performer Jeff Snow. We'll have a cozy fire going with wine and light refreshments served.

Jeff Snow is a talented multi-instrumentalist who shares the music, and the stories behind the music, of Scotland, Ireland and England.

Growing up in a home where old Scottish folk songs were the everyday sounds, Jeff developed an early love for Celtic music. Much of the history of these lands was preserved in song. You will see singing, laughing, lots of smiles and perhaps a few tears as we travel through time. There is no better example of this than the story of John Hunt. In 1855, at the age of 13, John Hunt left his family's home in Kilkelly, Ireland and came to the United States. He never returned to Ireland and never saw his family again. The Ballad of Kilkelly Ireland tells the story of the Hunt family.

Jeff's music has been described as "quiet and relaxing." Much of it is, but every once in a while, he breaks out and the foot stomping begins. Each concert is a wee bit different and adapted to the response and interest of the audience.

In concert Jeff plays the guitar, autoharp and bouzouki. He can also find his way around a drum set and most of the percussion family.

Jeff is a private guitar teacher and the author of the teaching method *Guitar Basics and Beyond*. He was featured in the December 2006 issue of *Acoustic Guitar Magazine* and is a contributing writer for *Acoustic Guitar* and *Autoharp Quarterly Magazines*.

When not singing, playing, or teaching Jeff can often be found taking photographs, on a golf course or a beach.

a picture of your creation and email it to us at ys@kennebunklibrary.org! We will create a virtual display with the photos. We can't wait to see your gingerbread person!



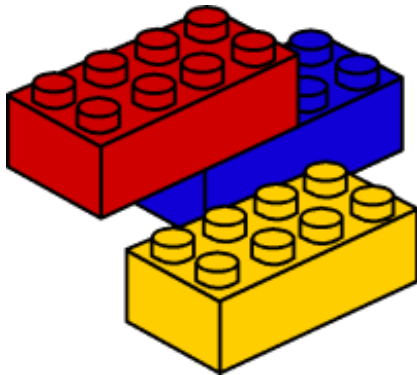
Beadcraft - December 7

Speers Gallery

December Artist: "Student Images"

The Kennebunk Free Library announces its next Speers Gallery exhibit, "Student Images" featuring photographs by students around the world facilitated by Picture Pals, an organization co-founded by Kennebunkport residents Lorraine and Paul Star and their lifelong friend Joe Highland who "has dedicated his life to helping others to have a better future."

After retiring from teaching, Paul and Lorraine, who are avid photographers and travelers, decided it was time to give back. Through Picture Plans, they offer photography workshops for youth in low resource and underserved communities throughout the world.



The exhibit will showcase Picture Plans student work produced during workshops in Mexico, Afghanistan, India, Nepal, Cambodia, Liberia, and the Cherokee Nation.

The students who took the photographs are between ages 15-18 and, previous to Picture Pals, had no formal training in photography. According to Paul, the students "embraced the camera and the photography courses. They prepared themselves to give the world a glimpse into their soul."

The exhibit runs from December 1-31, and the public is invited to a reception on Wednesday, December 14 from 5:00 - 7:00 p.m.
