Paying too much for your news? Learn how to access full text articles for free from all 5 of Maine's major daily newspapers, plus the *The Boston Globe*, *The Wall Street Journal*, *The New York Times*, and more through ProQuest US Newsstream in the Digital Maine Library, a service of the Maine State Library! KFL patrons



can access Digital Maine Library from a button on the home page of our website.

# Library Tidbits: Why it's important to cancel registrations if you can't attend.


## **Monthly Phone Wallpaper**


## Author Roger McCord - February 10

Author Roger McCord will be at the Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, February 10 to discuss photography, parenting, publishing, writing, and all things Phoebe while sharing his book Flight of the Phoebes. *Flight of the Phoebes* – Roger's first children's book – has a narrative arc that "all young birds leave the

nest, and so do our curious children." The protagonist is Maya, a curious young girl, as she and her dad talk about life – and growing up – as they watch the birds progress from hatchlings to flight.

Roger McCord is a career journalist with multiple New England Emmy and Maine Press Association awards as a content producer of "Chasing Maine" for themainemonitor.org. But he says his best work was as a stay-at-home dad for 10 years. He and his wife, Dr. Su Sepples, live in Cumberland. Their two grown children have flown off to Boston and NYC.




## Puzzle Swap - February 11


## **Die Well Death Education - February 24**

Join us at Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, February 24 from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. for the eighth session in the Die Well Death Education Series with host Leona Oceania. You are welcome to attend one or all of the sessions - no registration is required.

Rejecting the mainstream tradition of hiring funeral professionals to care for the deceased, families in search of a more personal and fulfilling way to say goodbye are taking an active role in caring for relatives who have died. *In the Parlor* shares an intimate story of three individuals who, with the support and guidance of their families and communities were

cared for after their deaths, at home. Julie, Ron, and Jarrad, all unique individuals with very different circumstances are portrayed in a thoughtful, quiet manner to give the viewer an idea of what "family directed death care" might look like. Both a critical look at the American relationship with death and in inquiry into the home death care movement, In the Parlor takes viewers on a journey where very few have gone, and challenges us to reflect on this uncomfortable subject, which so often is hidden away and ignored

### **Fiction Book Discussion - February 25**

Join us on Tuesday, February 25 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Heaven* & *Earth Grocery Store* by James McBride.

"National Book Award winner McBride (Deacon King Kong) tells a vibrant tale of Chicken Hill, a working-class neighborhood of Jewish, Black, and European immigrant families in Pottstown, Pa., where the 1972 discovery of a human skeleton unearths events that took place several decades earlier. In 1925, Moshe Ludlow owns the town's first integrated dance hall and theater with his wife, Chona, a beautiful woman who's undeterred by her polio-related disability and driven by her deep Jewish faith. Chona also runs the Heaven & Earth Grocery Store, where she extends kindness and indefinite credit

to her Jewish and Black customers alike. When Nate and Addie Tamblin, friends and employees of the Ludlows who are Black, approach the couple for help keeping their nephew, Dodo, from becoming a ward of the state, Chona doesn't hesitate to open her home to hide the boy from the authorities. As the racist white "good Christians" from down the hill begin to interfere, claiming to be worried about Dodo's welfare, a two-fold tragedy occurs that brings the community together to exact justice, which leads to the dead body discovered years later. McBride's pages burst with life, whether in descriptions of Moshe's dance hall, where folks get down to Chick Webb's "gorgeous, stomping, low-down, rip-roaring, heart-racing jazz," or a fortune teller who dances and cries out to God before registering her premonitions on a typewriter. This endlessly rich saga highlights the different ways in which people look out for one another." – Publishers Weekly



## Finding Wonder: Nature Journaling and Field Sketching - February 26

Rebekah Lowell is an award-winning author/illustrator and designer with a curiosity for the natural world. A survivor


of domestic abuse, she is passionate about resilience, freedom, and hope. She creates books for kids, designs fabric, runs an online shop, and paints at weddings. Her middle grade novel in verse, THE ROAD TO AFTER (Nancy Paulsen/Penguin), was a Junior Library Guild selection. Her picture book illustration for, CATCHING FLIGHT (Doubleday/Random House), was longlisted for the World Illustration Awards. She earned her BFA from The Rhode Island School of Design, and her MFA from Hollins University. She earned her Nature Journal Educator certificate through the Wild Wonder Foundation and is earning her certificate in Natural Science Illustration through RISD. She is also part of the 2025 Maine Master Naturalist Program. She serves on the Board for York County Audubon, transports birds for Avian Haven, and rescues monarchs from local hayfields. #### Blind Date with a Book



## CHILDRENS PROGRAMS



### February Artist: Joe Mulqueen

The Speers Gallery at the Kennebunk Free Library welcomes Kennebunk artist Joe Mulqueen. The exhibit runs February 1-28, and the public is invited to an artist reception on Wednesday, February 19 at 2 pm where Joe will present his talk "1000 Cranes: Origami Past and Present." All are welcome, especially children!

Joe's exhibit features a panel for each letter of the alphabet with a poem about the animal and an



origami model for that animal. He says "Ever since childhood I have had many interests. Two that are in this exhibit are poetry and origami, which I had been doing as separate activities for a number of years. The first time I combined them was when my friends started to have children, and I did a book for each child. Over time, I thought of using a central idea, such as the alphabet, to create different collections."

While Joe has written some longer poems, he is especially drawn to limericks and shorter poems that involve a play on words and childlike questions. He feels that simple things that relax and amuse us may be as beneficial as more serious content, and his goal is to share the enjoyment he has in creating

these pieces. Here's a limerick Joe created just for KFL!

It is enlightening regarding the US mindset that led to the nuclear bombing of Japan and the conflicting opinions in carrying out the missions. I enjoyed learning about this history but struggled with the harsh realities of war and our invention of napalm. When will we ever learn? The Boys in the Boat directed by George Clooney; written by Mark L. Smith ; produced by Grant Heslov and George Clooney.

Based on the book by the same name by Daniel James Brown from 2013. The book is great, and I think the movie did a good job of preserving the heart of the story. It takes place during the Great Depression at the University of Washington. A group of hard-working young men jump at the chance to join the rowing team to get the free room and board offered to rowers. The grueling training leads to the JV team competing better than the Varsity team. We get to know the hard luck background of several of the young men and can't help but root for them as they progress through competitions and end up going to the 1936 Olympics in Berlin.
