Georges Budagu Makoko - February 5

The Camden Conference presents Georges Budagu Makoko at the Kennebunk Free Library on Wednesday, February 5, 2020 at 6:00 p.m. He is the founder of Ladder to the Moon Network and Cofounder and Publisher of Amjambo Africa Newspaper.

Georges was born in Democratic Republic of Congo and moved to Rwanda in 1994 due to political unrest

in his country. He graduated from National University of Rwanda in Business Administration and moved to the United States in 2002, where he sought and received asylum.

He is the author of *Ladder to the Moon: Journey from the Congo to America*, a book about his life. Georges worked as Senior Property Manager with Avesta Housing. He was awarded 2012 Site Manager of the Year, a joint award from the United States Department of Agriculture Rural Housing Service and Maine Rural Development. He serves as a motivational speaker and professional interpreter. He speaks more than six languages, including English, French, Swahili, Kinyarwanda, Kirundi, Lingala and Kinyamulenge. He strongly believes in advocating for peace, reconciliation and justice for all.




Nonfiction Book Group - February 10

Join us on Monday, February 10 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Feather Thief* by Kirk Wallace Johnson.

"Johnson (*To Be a Friend Is Fatal*) makes his true-crime debut with this enthralling account of a truly bizarre crime. In 2009, Edwin Rist, an American student at London's Royal Academy of Music, stole 299 rare and scientifically significant bird skins from the Natural History Museum at Tring, in Hertfordshire, England, plucked their feathers, and sold them for top dollar to men who shared his obsession with the

Victorian art of salmon-fly tying. Johnson explores the expensive and exotic hobby of salmon-fly tying that emerged in the 19th century and uses that context to frame Rist's story, including his trial. Rist did not serve jail time after his lawyers successfully argued that Asperger's syndrome was to blame for his crime. In the book's final section, Johnson goes deep into the exotic bird and feather trade and concludes that though obsession and greed know no bounds, they certainly make for a fascinating tale. The result is a page-turner that will likely appeal to science, history, and true crime readers." (Publishers Weekly, vol 264, issue 46)



Author Jack Flowers - February 12

Jack Flowers was drafted in 1967 and sent to Vietnam as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army Corps of Engineers, stationed near Saigon. He volunteered for one of the most hazardous duties - leader of the 1st Infantry Division Tunnel Rats. According to Flowers, this was a life changing event from which he has never quite recovered but always remembered. Flowers says, "the



Tunnel Rats were some of the most courageous soldiers to fight in Vietnam. All were volunteers, slightly built, cunning, rebellious, trained in demolitions and dedicated to ferreting out the enemy below. In the beginning of the war, entering a tunnel with only a flashlight and a pistol was almost suicidal. But over time the Army learned to successfully navigate the underground labyrinths, retrieve vital intelligence and destroy the tunnels."

On Wednesday, February 12 at 6:00 p.m., Flowers will be here to discuss his novel *Rat Six*, based on his own experience as a Tunnel Rat. Flowers describes writing the novel as "a catharsis cleansing his soul and putting into words the horrors of a war he had opposed."



Adult Book Discussion - February 25

Join us on Tuesday, February 25 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *Beloved* by Toni Morrison.

Morrison encapsulates the horror of slavery and the consuming passion of motherhood in a single act of defiance by a runaway slave. The pivotal event occurs when Sethe, the slave, murders her infant daughter rather than permit her recapture. The story of Sethe's violation, her determined escape, and its horrific consequences is slowly played out in memory and gossip, as Morrison hints at the terrible secret in the woman's past--a legacy so dreadful that she has



alienated the black community, driven off her two sons, and sent her remaining daughter into her own form of exile. Sethe is haunted not only by her own memories and her neighbors' reactions, but also by the ghostly presence of the murdered girl, who is called simply Beloved and who appears just as her mother, released from prison, seems ready to embark on a normal, loving relationship with a man. Sethe's history, too awful to be narrated in a straightforward, chronological manner, is related in kaleidoscopic fashion, complete with the shatteringly eloquent and accurate dialogue that Morrison has displayed in her earlier fiction, such as Song of Solomon (Booklist 73:1704 Jl 15 74).

AARP Tax Help - February 6, 13, 20, 27

It's tax season again at KFL! This year, like last year, the federal 1040A and 1040 EZ forms have all been combined into one 1040 form. The 1040 forms and booklets have arrived at the library and will be available at the adult circulation desk. As in recent years, we will not be receiving any state forms. Library staff will be more than welcome to help you print any forms from the IRS or state website for just \$.10 per page. We can also provide you with instructions for ordering forms to be mailed to you directly.

If you need some help preparing your taxes, we will once again be hosting AARP Tax Aides every Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. The first session this year will be held on February 6, with the program running through April 9. People will be seen on a first-come, first-served basis only. We will have a sign-up sheet available in the lobby when the library doors open at 9:30.

So let's talk about the wait.... Unfortunately, because of insurance regulations, we are unable to allow anyone into the library before we open,



regardless of how cold, snowy, or miserable it is outside. We would encourage you to come close to opening time and wait for your appointment inside the library. The heroic AARP volunteers have been great about staying until everyone has been seen. We will have hot chocolate, marshmallows, and snacks available, a fire blazing in the fireplace, and plenty of reading material. All-in-all it will be a far more pleasant wait than standing outside in the snow before we open.

Children's Programs

Junior Science: Rubber Band Helicopters! - February 3

Science can be wacky, wild, or funny, but it's always an adventure! We will be holding a Junior Science series of programming for young scientists to experiment and observe the surprising results. Come join us on Monday, February 3 at 4:00 p.m. as we make Rubber Band Helicopters! We will create our own helicopters and discuss how they fly.

January's Junior Science was a blast as we completed a series of Yeast Experiments! We discussed how yeast survives and the effect it has on our food. Then we attempted to inflate a



balloon by filling a bottle with yeast and warm water, feeding it sugar to make it bloom, then capping the bottle with the balloon. We were met with limited success but the kids enjoyed discussing what might have gone wrong with the experiment.

Beadcraft - February 5

Perler Beads - tiny plastic beads that can melt - were first introduced as a craft in Sweden in the 1950's and we still love them! Children ages 6 and up, or age 5 with a caregiver, are invited to join us for an afternoon of beading fun on Wednesday, February 5 at 1:00 p.m. Design suggestions will be offered, but creativity is encouraged! African American Read-In - February 12


In honor of Black History Month, join us for an African American Read-In program on Wednesday, February 12 at 3:45 p.m. We will read various



picture books by African American creators, and explore learning and creativity stations. This program is part of the National African American Read-In, a month-long event occurring during Black History Month. According to the National Council of Teachers of English, "The National African American Read-In is the nation's first and oldest event dedicated to diversity in literature. It was established in 1990 by the Black Caucus of the National Council of Teachers of English to make literacy a significant part of Black History Month." This program is open to all ages. The books are written for readers age 4-8 years old, but can be enjoyed by anyone. No registration is required.

Black History Month Book Tasting - February 18

From Jacqueline Woodson to Jason Reynolds, African American authors write stories that make us laugh, cry, and think. In honor of Black History Month, join us for a Black History Month Book Tasting program on Tuesday, February 18 at 2:00 p.m. Readers will have the opportunity to sample and "taste" middle grade novels written by African American authors. This program was inspired by the National African American Read-In, a month-long event occurring during Black History Month. This program is open to ages 8 and up. We will be



sampling middle-grade novels, which are directed towards readers ages 8-12. Space is limited, and <u>registration is required</u>.

Discovery Station - February 19

Full STEAM ahead to Discovery Station at Kennebunk Free Library! Discovery Station is a monthly STEAM program designed for children



2-5 years of age accompanied by a parent or caregiver. STEAM is an approach to learning that uses <u>Science</u>, <u>Technology</u>, <u>Engineering</u>, <u>Art</u>, and <u>Math through activities that support curiosity and creativity. STEAM activity stations will give children, with their parent or caregiver, an opportunity to engage in hands-on learning while having fun!</u>

Join us on Wednesday, February 19, at 3:45 p.m. and have fun with this month's theme, All About Dinosaurs! The program is limited to 12 children, and registration is required.

STEM Family Adventure Room - February 20

Get your thinking cap ready, because we have a space ship to save! Families of all shapes and sizes are invited to KFL on Thursday, February 20 between 1:30 and 4:00 p.m. to try their hand at our drop-in Adventure Room. puzzles. This event is suggested for families with children, but adults are also welcome to come try their hand at the challenges.


Drop-In Craft - February 21

February Artist: The Center Artists

The Kennebunk Free Library announces its February 2020 exhibition, "The Center Artists", the works of George Acker, Florence Damon, Marlene Engdahl, Alan Platt, and Kay Simmons.

These artists represent a portion of a larger group that meets every Friday at **The Center**, 175 Port Road, Kennebunk. The

class is led by teacher and painter Liz Armstrong. It is a diverse group in terms of prior painting experience and years of practice. The group's commonality is their medium, which is acrylics, and their love of painting. Each artist has developed their own style. Local landscape, seascape and floral subjects are frequently the inspiration for their paintings. Several of the represented artists in the group have been invited to show their work in the Kennebunk River Club show and some group members have also been successful in selling their work.



All members paint for their personal enjoyment and individual painting goals and support each other in class. Often in class, one student's work will open a discussion led by their teacher on an aspect of painting such as composition, color or form which is then useful for others. Many of the group members paint outside of class.

The Center Artists group vary in ages between 60s and 90s. They exemplify the very worthwhile practice of lifelong learning and demonstrate that new goals can be reached at any age.
