
## **Library News**

#### **AARP Tax Help Not Available This Year**

We are very sorry to announce that we have heard from AARP that they will not be able to provide in-person tax help in our area this year. There is a possibility that they may be offering services in other towns/counties. They evaluated each area before making decisions, considering a number of factors. If you need additional forms, <u>email us</u> the form numbers in advance and we can print them out for you to pick up during curbside services for ten cents per page. ### Oil and Indigenous Peoples in the Russian Arctic - February 3

The Camden Conference and the Kennebunk Free Library present Laura Henry, Professor of Government at Bowdoin College, on Wednesday, February 3 at 6:00 p.m. via Zoom. 
The rapid growth of the oil and gas industry in the Russian Arctic is crucial the country's plans for continued economic growth and international influence. However, many of these sites of extraction are located in close proximity to the country's Arctic Indigenous communities and overlap with their territories of traditional use, such as reindeer herding,



hunting, and fishing. In this talk, Professor Henry examines how oil companies interact with indigenous peoples and when they come into conflict and when they reach agreement. Examining several cases in the Russian Arctic and sub-Arctic, Henry considers how local communities navigate a complex political context in which global rules and standards that prioritize indigenous rights and environmental protection interact with domestic laws and institutions that tend to advantage industry. Research in Russian indigenous communities in the Nenets Autonomous Okrug, the Komi Republic, and on Sakhalin Island also illustrates how expectations based on the Soviet era shape how communities engage extractive industries in order to ensure their economic and social well-being.

Laura A. Henry is a Professor in the Department of Government and Legal Studies at Bowdoin College in Brunswick, Maine. Her research investigates Russia's post-Soviet transformation, focusing on state society relations, environmental politics, and the interaction of transnational and local actors. Henry's current book project (*Bringing Global Governance Home*) compares how NGOs from the BRICS countries use global agreements on climate change, HIV/AIDS, and deforestation to leverage policy change at home. Henry is the author of *Red to Green: Environmental Activism in Post-Soviet Russia* (Cornell University Press, 2010) and the co-editor of *Russian Civil Society: A Critical Assessment* (M.E. Sharpe, 2006). Her work has appeared in *Environmental Politics, Global Environmental Politics, Post-Soviet Affairs*, and *Europe-Asia Studies*, among other journals. She has been a Watson Foundation fellow and a Fulbright Scholar. Her research has received support from the National Security Education Program, the Social Science Research Council, and the International Research and Exchange Board.

### **Nonfiction Book Group - February 8**

"Who pays serious attention to the millions of Americans living with or near conditions such as raw sewage, toxic water, and poisonous air? Flowers does. The founder and director of the Center for Rural Enterprise and Environmental Justice (CREEJ) uncovers the unsettling details of living standards in stretches of her native Alabama as well as the urban Midwest, central California, coastal Florida, Alaska, Hawaii, Native American reservations, and elsewhere. Her account follows her activism that received attention for social justice work, from high school in Lowndes County through college to teaching at public schools in Washington, DC,

Fayetteville, NC, and Detroit, and then back to Lowndes County to organize around environmental justice issues. She describes leading CREEJ to help address both immediate and systemic impacts of inadequate sanitation, health disparities, and poverty in communities marginalized because of who lives there—people who policymakers and society at large dismiss as not worthy of respect, she notes. The book includes a foreword by Bryan Stevenson." (Library Journal, vol 145, issue 11, p98)




# Take and Make: Succulent Kit - Available to pick up February 22

"Set in 1974 Alaska, this sweeping tale follows a girl coping with the dangers of domestic violence. Though ill-prepared for the extreme and harsh conditions, 13-year-old Leni and her parents, Ernt and Cora, have to learn how to survive in the unforgiving wild of their new home on the Kenai Peninsula. With the help of the small-knit community of endearing fellow homesteaders, the Allbrights manage to just barely stay afloat. But Ernt, who has never recovered from the trauma of fighting in the Vietnam War, struggles with the isolation and the interminably dark days of winter. Leni grows up witnessing

her father (who is increasingly unable to control his paranoia and jealousy) abuse her beloved mother. Leni's greatest comfort and escape is her schoolmate and neighbor Matthew. Over the years, their friendship evolves into a forbidden romance. Hannah highlights, with vivid description, the natural dangers of Alaska juxtaposed against incongruous violence." 


#### **Teen Take-Home Kits**

Beowulf: a new translation by Maria Dahvana Headley

Ok, I hear your groaning. I too, have a dark history with this title, but let me explain. The author has done extensive studies of the earliest texts as well as multiple translations through the centuries. Just the introduction is worth your time, fascinating history of the tale telling, especially the downplaying of Grendel's mother. The epic poem itself it redone in current language and the story is engaging! Kings, queens, mead halls,

monsters, dragons and golden hoards in mountain caves - what's not to like?

The Evening and the Morning by Ken Follett

Calling all "Pillars of the Earth" fans because here is the prequel! It begins in 997 CE at what will be Kingsbridge, but prior to the bridge it is known as Dreng's Ferry. England is being attacked by the Welsh and the Vikings as the people struggle to survive life in the Dark ages. Follett is great at showing us how the rich and the poor lived and loved. He is also good at depicting good and evil among the rich, the poor, different cultures and the church. Great story line and characters and best of all, Follett left another hundred years before "Pillars" timeframe for another prequel. You won't be disappointed.

I loved this movie! The story of the Blessed Mother Mary's apparitions to three peasant, shepherd children is shown through the tumult of the effects on the family, the town, the church and politicians. It so beautifully depicts Portugal toward the end of World War I: the people, how they dressed, lived and earned their living. The special features on the making of the movie were fascinating.


### Jenny, Library Assistant

February is a great time to peruse *Wildflowers and Winter Weeds* written and illustrated by Lauren Brown to learn the winter forms of many of our local wildflowers. (Note: An older edition of this book is titled *Weeds in Winter*, and a newer edition is titled *Weeds and Wildflowers in Winter*.)

The book starts with a finder key, and the illustrated glossary that follows is very helpful for both learning botanical terms and using the key. The plant accounts are organized by family, and for many of the families, a short description of the family introduces the member plant or plants. For each plant, the author provides both a scientific name and one or more common names and includes a description alongside a black and white illustration. I like that the illustrations are not perfect examples of the plant but rather look the way you would find the plant after time and weather have left their marks.

I enjoyed reading this book while I was warm and cozy indoors, but it definitely motivated me to get outside, enjoy some walks in the cold fresh air, and pay attention to these plants who might otherwise escape my notice. I was also able to "key out" (i.e. identify using the finder key) a type of Speedwell (*Veronica sp.*) and discovered that the unopened seed capsules are heart-shaped!
