Local Therapist and Author Presents Program on "Personal Freedom"

Kennebunk therapist and author <u>Kingsley Gallup</u> wants people who feel trapped in their lives to feel free and experience happiness, joy, and peace. Gallup will read from her guidebook, "Project Personal Freedom," and answer questions about how people can attain personal freedom, no matter what their circumstances on **Saturday**, **January 14 at 1:00 PM**.

"Project Personal Freedom" is a daily guidebook that offers inspirational and instructional tips about how people can access their own freedom. The book is designed to help everyone, from people coping with occasional stress to those living with chronic emotional and psychological conditions such as depression, anxiety, and PTSD. According to Gallup, the book is for people who "feel trapped by life circumstances, belief systems, and/or emotions."




Gallup created Personal Freedom Therapy (PFT) based on what she sees as a widespread desire for empowerment and self-determination. She says that PFT offers a concrete, solution-oriented approach that helps her clients live authentic, liberated lives. Following the reading, Gallup will answer audience questions and facilitate a discussion. Light refreshments will be served.

Gallup is a licensed professional counselor, a nationally-certified counselor, a distance-credentialed counselor, and a certified mediator. "Project Personal Freedom" is the result of her work with hundreds of clients during the last 16 years.

Saco Author Debuts Novel About Vietnam War

<u>David Arenstam</u>, a writer, journalist, and teacher at Thornton Academy, will read selections from his debut novel, "Homecoming: A Soldier's Story of Loyalty, Courage, and Redemption," on **Tuesday**, **January 17 at 6:00 PM**.

Based on hundreds of hours of interviews with



Vietnam veterans, "Homecoming" follows two American aviators assigned to the Aerial Rocket Artillery in Vietnam. Crew chief Russell Warriner and co-pilot Bobby Connelly are brought together for a mission in early 1968. As the Tet Offensive rages, the two men discover that their courage and strength alone may not be enough to bring them home safely.

A Bates College graduate and finalist for the Maine Teacher of the Year award, Arenstam recently received his master's degree in journalism from Harvard University. "Homecoming" grew out of a project for his graduate program, in which he interviewed the real-life Russell Warriner, a 68-year-old Vietnam veteran who lives in Old Orchard Beach.

According to Jon Marcus, a former Boston Magazine editor, Arenstam's novel is "a meticulously researched book not at politics or strategy, but at the men who fought the war in Vietnam - whose stories we risk forgetting."

Local Horror Author Discussion

On **Saturday**, **January 21 at 2:00 PM** local author, Martin Campbell, will talk about writing horror and read from his debut short-story compilation, *Maine After Dark: A Collection of Nightmares*.

Martin will be joined by two other local authors, Jeff Deck and David Price, to discuss the different aspects of horror such as themes, inspirations, writing styles and how writing in the genre has changed over the years.



Martin has written several short stories for various anthologies, magazines and websites. He is a Maine-based author who grew up with a fascination for reading about things that go bump in the night. He has been a fan of horror, fantasy and science fiction his whole life.

Memoir by Local Author, Rebel Without A Clue

Join local author Steve Hrehovcik on **Wednesday**, **February 1 at 6:00 PM** as he discusses his recently completed memoir *Rebel Without A Clue*. Steve has written more than 500 feature articles newspapers, magazines and business publications. In addition, he has written movie scripts, comedy stage plays, musical reviews and a comedy television travel show featured on the Maine Public Broadcasting Network. He also writes poetry and is working on a musical comedy.

John D. Doughty will present on February 7 (snow date: 2/27) at 6:00 PM. His presentation is on Global Migration and Refugees: Why People Migrate, the Economics and Security Implications of Immigration and the Current Refugee Crisis, and What Lies Ahead.

The Bill of Rights and You

KFL is hosting a new pop-up exhibition from the <u>National Archives</u>, *The Bill of Rights and You*, commemorating the 225th anniversary of the ratification of this landmark document.

The Bill of Rights and You spotlights one of the most remarkable periods in American history, explores the origins of the first ten amendments to the U.S. Constitution (collectively known as the Bill of Rights), illustrates how each amendment protects U.S. citizens, and looks at how Americans exercise the rights outlined in the amendments. The Bill of Rights and You invites visitors to connect directly with the people, places, and events that mark this historic document's evolution. This exhibit runs through January 31, 2017.


The exhibit's co-curator Jennifer Johnson states: "The Bill of Rights represents the Founder's vision that it would be the people, through votes, that could change the Constitution with enough consensus. And



when the people desired a Bill of Rights, our first ten amendments were added to our governing charter."






