

Nonfiction Book Group - January 14

Join us on Monday, January 14 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Natural Causes* by Barbara Ehrenreich.

"With her trademark take-no-prisoners prose, Ehrenreich (*Nickel and Dimed*) argues that a desperation to control our fates leads us to cling to ritualized medical procedures, dietary fads, and gym exercises that generate corporate profits but do nothing to change our destiny. Ehrenreich criticizes the classist arrogance of framing sickness as a moral failing, when health largely hinges on uncontrollable vagaries of our




genes and cells (not to mention poverty). The author combines two themes: the first is the fiery treatise against medicalization and the "cult of wellness," while the second is a mishmash of theories of the human body at war with itself and notions of an "animate universe." With a PhD in cellular immunology, the author's credentials in science and medicine are unimpeachable, and her ability to make the her subjects accessible is unsurpassed. In this book, she drifts into a dystopian and idiosyncratic scientism, softening the potency of the text's first half. VERDICT A welcome reminder to relax in the face of our own mortality, this is fast-paced, hard-nosed discourse. Sure to appeal to dissidents from the cult of wellness." (Library Journal, vol 143, issue 5, p103)

China in the 21st Century - January 15

The Camden Conference presents Matt Ward at the Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, January 15 at 6:00. In his presentation, "Modern China in the 21st Century," Ward will discuss China's rise from poverty to global economic power. He will explore what that rise means for the rest of the world and what it means for the United States specifically.

Matt Ward is a retired Foreign Service officer. He is Past-President of the World Affairs Council of Maine and has been an Adjunct Professor at the USM School of Social Work where he taught multicultural social work, and in the Political Science Department where he taught modern Chinese politics. He currently lectures on international issues and consults on cross-cultural matters.



Matt Ward served the United States as a career Foreign Service Officer from 1967 to 1996. Specializing in economic, developmental and humanitarian issues, Matt served in Vietnam (CORDS), Cambodia, Haiti, Myanmar, Iran, Thailand, Indonesia, Singapore, Luxembourg, China (including Taiwan and Hong Kong) and the Sudan. He was a pioneer in developing refugee processing systems for "boat people" arriving on the shores of Indonesia and Singapore, and was the director, in Taiwan, of the school that trained U.S. diplomats in Chinese language, culture, economics, history and politics in preparation for service in China and Hong Kong.

This presentation is sponsored by the Camden Conference, held February 22-24, 2019 in Camden, Maine. The topic of this year's conference is: "Is This China's Century?" KFL is a participating library bringing an extension of this conference to our community.



Educated initially as an engineer, a binocular tour of the heavens ignited a passion for the stars that led him to the University of Pennsylvania for a M.S. degree in astronomy and a 40+-year career as an astronomy educator. He has been privileged to convey the splendor of the universe to students of all ages, initially as a university instructor, then as a school district planetarium director, adult school teacher and elder hostel instructor. As a Solar System Ambassador, Scott enjoys the opportunity to educate and inspire others with NASA's magnificent discoveries.

International Golden Retriever Rescue - January 22

The Camden Conference presents Peter Fitzgerald, Emeritus Professor of Law, and Allyson MacKenna, Executive Director of Yankee Golden Retriever Rescue, at the Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, January 22 at 6:00 p.m. Their talk, "From Chinese Streets to American Homes: International Golden Retriever Rescue and Adoption," is free and open to all.

In recent years, pet ownership in China has increased significantly, due in no small part to the development of a large, urban, middle class. China is now said to have the world's third largest dog population, estimated at more than 27 million animals, and a booming pet and pet-products marketplace. Many



- especially younger - Chinese welcome this development. However, the legacy of the Maoist era when pet dogs were viewed as part of a Western lifestyle that was inappropriate for socialist China is still seen in a wide range of conflicting legal and social attitudes towards pet dogs.

Accordingly, alongside the increasing number of pet dogs, there are also persistent social issues with puppy mills, strays, abandoned animals, and even trafficking in stolen pets - and as a result there are a substantial number of Chinese dogs in need of new homes. Yankee Golden Retriever Rescue is one of a handful of breed-specific rescue organizations that works with its Chinese counterparts to bring some of these dogs to the United States for adoption.

This talk will provide an overview of the current status of companion animals in China and how it is grappling with many of the same issues seen in this country and elsewhere, and will also describe YGRR's specific experience and expertise in handling international rescues and finding new "forever" homes for Golden Retrievers here in New England.

Presenters include Emeritus Professor of Law Peter Fitzgerald, a member of the Board of Directors of the Camden Conference and author of the law school text "*International Issues in Animal Law.*" Also speaking will be Allyson MacKenna, the Executive Director of Yankee Golden Retriever Rescue, which was established in 1985 and has placed over 5,600 homeless Golden Retrievers into loving homes. Additionally, YGRR will also bring one or more of its "China dogs" for you to meet at the presentation!

required, and is limited to 15 readers. For more information or to register, call 985-2173. Come read with us!


Soap Carving - January 17



Overdrive is Coming Back!

In March 2017 Kennebunk Free Library moved to the online platform CloudLibrary (CL). Previously using the platform OverDrive (OD), we made the switch as a member of the statewide library consortium because it provided a very economical way to allow us to continue to offer a wide-range of e-book and e-aubdiobook materials.

Unfortunately though, we still don't have any control on the titles purchased for the collection and an added problem is that patrons are no longer able to use e-ink technology devices, namely the Kindle Paperwhite, because they are not compatible with CL.

Fast-forward almost two years. We heard a lot of feedback from our community survey this past spring about the disappointment our patrons were experiencing using CL. Whether it was the 600 day wait list for an item or the inability to use their Paperwhite KFL knew we needed to make things right.

Just as staff started the discussion around how to bring back OD we heard from Ginny Crowley, board member of the Webhannet Charitable Foundation. Thanks to her hard work and the generosity of the Foundation, KFL received a donation to get OD up and going. This time around KFL will have our own private platform for only our patrons. While we won't have the breadth of materials available through CL, we will have the ability with OD to curate the collection to the specifications of our patrons, wait lists will be much shorter since only those with a KFL card can access it, and patrons can once again use their Paperwhites. For those that still like the broader range of available titles and don't mind the long wait times we will still belong to CL as well.

More information will be coming soon. Plan for a release date in early February.

Coming Soon: A Library Telescope!

Thanks to a generous donation from of the Friends of the Kennebunk Free Library, the library will be adding a telescope to our circulating collection! The telescope was modified by Cornerstones of Science, a Maine nonprofit that works to bring STEM programming to libraries nationwide, to ensure that it is user friendly and sturdy enough to hold up to repeated use. Cornerstones of Science also provided free training to the KFL staff.

Beginning on January 7, the telescope can be checked out at the adult circulation desk for a week at a time (all checkouts will be Wednesday - Tuesday). You will be able to make reservations in advance, so you can plan ahead for your stargazing weekends.

KFL staff is very excited about this new addition - we hope you will be too! - and grateful to The Friends of KFL and Cornerstones of Science for making it possible.





Adult Collection Reorganization

On January 9, we will begin reorganizing the adult collection to make it more accessible. Large print books will finally be all together again (and off of the floor!). The biggest change: mysteries will be integrated with the fiction collection. We have heard from a number of you that it is confusing to have authors' works spread across the two different sections. We will continue to use the green "mystery" labels so mystery books will still be easily identifiable.

Our goal is to minimize the amount of bending and stretching necessary for patrons and staff alike. The new configuration will make books more visible and easier to reach. We will have many maps and signs available to point you in the right direction as you adjust to the new set-up.

Thank you for your patience while we are in transition. We are hoping that it will be a fairly speedy turn-around but we will likely be in flux for a few days. As always, we appreciate your feedback.
