
In Stitches - March 2, 9, 16, 23, 30

Nonfiction Book Group - March 8

"The bestselling author deals with one of the most satisfying goodvs.-evil battles in history, the year (May 1940 to May 1941) during which Churchill and Britain held off Hitler. Bookshelves groan with histories of Britain's finest hour, but Larson (Dead Wake: The Last Crossing of the Lusitania, 2015, etc.) employs a mildly unique strategy, combining an intense, almost day-to-day account of Churchill's actions with those of his family, two of his officials (Frederick Lindemann, who was Churchill's prime science adviser,

and Lord Beaverbrook, minister of air production), and staff, including private secretary Jock Colville and bodyguard Walter Thompson. Since no one doubted they lived in extraordinary times and almost everyone kept journals and wrote letters, the author takes full advantage of an avalanche of material, much of which will be unfamiliar to readers." (Kirkus Reviews, February 1, 2020)





Staff Picks & Messages

This month, in addition to newer reviews, we're going to tell you about some of our favorite books that have been buried in the stacks and not checked out for a few years. We hope you enjoy them as much as we did!

Let Us Dream – The Path To A Better Future by Pope Francis

This book asks the reader to take a look at what Covid 19 has revealed about our global situation. Pope Francis is troubled by an attitude that the most important thing is "to get back to normal" rather than use this pandemic to reevaluate our economic inequalities, use of our environment and our priorities. The proposed plan uses current findings of scientists, economists, activists, as well as spiritual traditions, to encourage each of us to explore new possibilities. The uplifting ideas presented are practical and point to a great future for humanity.

My Dark Vanessa by Kate Elizabeth Russell

Psychological fiction that brings you into the mind of a teacher that grooms and preys upon his young female students. His brilliant portrayal of the relationship as true love and as himself as the victim to Vanessa is fascinating. Of course, what we know as a predatory relationship, deeply contorts Vanessa as she grows to adulthood. The author does a great job of helping the reader see how our cultural norms allow such atrocities to take place and the various ways bystanders and family react.

We were invited to show some love to a great book that got buried in the stacks section and my two picks are both old historical novels with strong, female protagonists:

Kristin Lavransdatter by Sigrid Undset

I love the view into 14th century Norway and strong-willed Kristen that this story offers. After I watched the DVD (available from KFL-English subtitles) I had to read the book.

Katherine by Anya Seton

Same century but in England, this is the love story of Katherine Swynford and John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster and the third surviving son of King Edward III.

Forest Trees of Maine is a publication of the Maine Forest Service. Our library has a copy of the 1908 – 2008 centennial edition, and a <u>free e-book version</u> is available for download in part and in full on the Maine Forest Service's website. This spiral bound book is a guide for identifying and learning more about the tree species that grow in Maine. In addition to historical and other introductory materials, the book begins with a winter identification key as well as a summer identification key, a comprehensive glossary, and several labeled botanical drawings. Each tree species has a one or two page profile with multiple photos and a written description of identifying features, such as bark, buds and flowers. I really enjoyed reading and later using this book to learn more about the trees with whom I share a home. For example, I successfully walked myself through identifying a tree in my yard with the use of the winter key to confirm that the little evergreen residing just feet from my home is a Balsam Fir, which the guide tells me is the most abundant tree in the state!

Chocolate Wars: the 150-Year Rivalry Between the World's Greatest Chocolate Makers by Deborah Cadbury

I wince when I notice this book still sitting on the shelf rather than checked out and being devoured by some food history fan or reader with a sweet tooth. It is such a fascinating read! Written by a member of the Cadbury (yes, that Cadbury) family, Chocolate Wars gives an in-depth look at the development of the Cadbury company and other early chocolate manufacturers, walking through the innovative technologies created, borrowed, stolen, and adapted to transform chocolate from a gritty and bitter Victorian health food drink to the confection we know and love today. Alongside the progress of the food itself, we get a compelling look into the rise of the Cadbury brothers' business in which they applied their deep Quaker values and endeavoured to provide the best for their workers including building homes, schools, recreation areas, indeed an entire village for them- notably catching the eye of one Milton Hershey. One word of warning-this book will absolutely have you craving chocolate, so it may be best to have a bar on hand while reading.
