Reader's Choice Book Club - March 7




Reader's Choice Book Club will meet on Monday, March 7 at 2:00 p.m. in the Walker Room at the library, and our theme will be: *Surprise*.

Nonfiction Book Group - March 7

Join us on Monday, March 7 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *How the Word Is Passed* by Clint Smith. The discussion will be held in person at the library. Masks are required inside the building.

"Poet, educator, and writer Smith (Counting Descent) opens this latest work with his own story of growing up Black in New Orleans. Although



he often passed by monuments to Confederate generals and former slave auction houses, he didn't know much about the history of slavery in the U.S., nor was he very curious about it, until 2017, when widespread campaigns to tear down these monuments began. Smith then started to read classics in the historiography of American slavery and toured historical sites related to U.S. slavery, to interview people who worked there and people who visited them. He pieces together how the history of slavery has been falsely constructed to uphold white supremacy—the same history that has now, in some cases, been rebuilt to form a more honest picture. Some of the sites and histories that Smith revisits are well-known (for instance, Monticello and Sally Hemings's story); others, such as Louisiana's Angola prison/plantation, or the

benefit Wall Street drew from slavery long after its abolition in New York, are refreshing new takes." (Library Journal, vol 146, issue 5, p77)

Town Historian Kathy Ostrander Roberts - March 21



Town Historian Kathy Ostrander Roberts and Dr. J. Leith Smith will be at the Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, March 21 at 6:00 to discuss artifacts collected during excavations at Ridge Community by the Maine Historic Preservation Commission. Artifacts will be on display at KFL, beginning March 8.

The artifacts were uncovered during three archaeological surveys in Kennebunk on what is referred to as The Previously Enslaved Persons Community of Kennebunk. These surveys were initiated and funded by the Town of Kennebunk's Bicentennial Committee as there **2020 Legacy Project** at the urging of its chairman, Kathy

Ostrander Roberts. The site of the community had been mentioned in local histories by Edward Emerson Bourne and Daniel Remich however the location was vaguely referred to as "a ridge of land in Kennebunk opposite so and so's property." Only from 20 years of careful deed and record research performed by Ostrander Roberts was the exact location determined. This site and two others uncovered by Ostrander Roberts's research will be the focus of future surveys as well.

"The members of our Bicentennial Committee felt the need to bring the lives of these marginalized members of our community to light, noting that until now, they have been forgotten and their story left untold". With the full support of the Town of Kennebunk, the committee unanimously voted that this project would be a lasting educational legacy to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Kennebunk. With the research she had compiled, Ostrander Roberts reached out to Dr. Arthur Speiss, Senior Archaeologist of Maine Historic Preservation Commission who, with colleague Dr. J. Leith Smith came to Kennebunk to meet with Bicentennial Committee members to walk the site and do a preliminary shovel test. Concrete evidence indicated the site was correct and plans were made immediately to conduct a series of surveys. Dr. J. Leith Smith with an extensive background in African Cultural Studies, became the lead archaeologist for the project.


Dr. Smith notes: "This site is a highly significant archaeological resource that is one of a very few that are known to exist in Maine. What makes it particularly unique is the early time period immediately following emancipation. The narrative that can be told from careful archaeological investigation is of extreme importance, not only for the combined history of Wells and Kennebunk, but for its history of the African American presence in the state as a whole. The fact that the site appears to be in a pristine state of preservation and was never reoccupied or disturbed upon abandonment is almost-unheard of. The nature of the site and its condition thus provides tremendous potential to inform on the lives of the African Americans who are transitioning in status both legally and personally from enslaved to free".

"After acing a job interview and accepting a marriage proposal, Dannie Kohan has had the perfect day. That is, until she awakens to find herself five years in the future with a completely different man.

Just one hour in that alternate reality shakes Dannie to her core. After all, highly ambitious Dannie and her boyfriend, David, have plotted out their lives in minute detail, and the sexy man in her dream—was it a dream?—is most certainly not in the script. Serle (The Dinner List, 2018) deftly spins these magical threads

into Dannie's perfectly

structured life, leaving not only Dannie, but also the reader wondering whether Dannie time traveled or hallucinated. Her best friend, Bella, would delight in the story given that she thinks Dannie is much too straight-laced, and some spicy dreaming might push Dannie to find someone more passionate than David. Unfortunately, glamorous Bella is in Europe with her latest lover. Ever pragmatic, Dannie consults her therapist, who almost concurs that it was likely a dream, and throws herself into her work. Pleased to have landed the job at a prestigious law firm, Dannie easily loses her worries in litigation. Soon four and a half years have passed with no wedding date set, and Bella is back in the U.S. with a new man in her life. A man who turns out to be literally the man of Dannie's dream. The sheer fact of Aaron Gregory's existence forces Dannie to reevaluate her trust in the laws of physics as well as her decision to marry David, a decision that seems less believable with each passing day. And as the architecture of Dannie's overplanned life disintegrates, Serle twists and twines the remnants of her dream into a surprising future.


Klara and The Sun by Kazuo Ishiguro
