Tech Time - March 1, 2, 8, 9, 15, 16, 22, 23, 29, 30







Nonfiction Book Group - March 13

Join us on Monday, March 13 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *South to America* by Imani Perry .

"Award-winning historian Perry (African American studies, Princeton Univ.; Looking for Lorraine) takes readers on a road trip through the South, arguing that its history is fundamental to understanding the United States as a whole. As a native Alabaman and a professor of African American studies, Perry



blends stories about her own life, family, and friends with the histories, literature, and culture of 18 cities and regions in the South, mostly focusing on Black history but also touching on issues of immigration, the environment, and pop culture. She starts in the "Upper South," exploring colonial history in Virginia, Maryland, and Washington, DC, then covers the "Solidified South" of Alabama, North Carolina, Nashville, and Memphis, and finally the "Water People" of the coasts including Savannah, Florida, New Orleans, and the Bahamas. The chapters about cities where Perry has a strong connection (e.g., Birmingham, where she spent her early childhood) are moving, but others can be hard to follow, when the hodgepodge of facts and stories don't seem to be leading to a specific point about that place. VERDICT Recommended for readers of travelogues and African

American and Southern history, as long as they like a meandering style." --Kate Stewart (Library Journal, vol 146, issue 12, p98)

MAINE SPEAKS supports individuals and organizations who want to bring people in their community together to learn from a gifted speaker who shares their expertise and lived experience in engaging ways.


Puzzle Exchange - March 21

Adult Book Discussion - March 28



Join us on Tuesday, March 28 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *Nothing to See Here* by Kevin Wilson.

"As teenagers, wealthy Madison and scholarship student Lillian became unlikely friends at a prestigious boarding school, until Lillian was expelled for something Madison did. Now that they're in their late 20s, Madison is married to a senator, and she invites Lillian—who spends her days working at a grocery store and smoking pot in her mother's attic—to their estate to care for her new stepchildren...who are prone to literally bursting into flames when upset. The novel is a love letter to the weirdness and difficulties of children and of parenting, with or without spontaneous human combustion. The fire is a lovely and flexible

metaphor for childhood—the pain, joy, and mania of it—as vital, beautiful, and terrifying as kids themselves can be. Lillian tells the story in an easy, engaging voice, cynical and funny without being caustic. Like the author's The Family Fang, this is another story of a family that is as delightfully bizarre as it is heartfelt and true." (Library Journal, vol 144, issue 8, p69)

Groundbreaking Women - March 28



Women of the last century worked tirelessly to open doors that had always been closed before. Join us to hear the stories of three local women that each in their own way, fought barriers and rose to levels their mothers could never imagine.

Eva Barnfather started her career as an airline "stewardess" in 1944, worked as a teacher and became the first female vice principal in her Massachusetts community.

Barbara Sharood was a member of the first Georgetown University class to admit women. She graduated in 1958 as valedictorian – summa cum laude. (pictured leading the way in photo)

Diantha DD Harrington received her law degree in 1966 at Cornell Law School as one of 5 female students in a class of 150. She practiced law in Los Angeles, CA, then after marrying moved to Boston and worked in insurance and as a legal consultant for the MA land court.

Each woman has a great story, and we are grateful for their willingness to share them at Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, March 28 at 6:30 p.m. There are so many more women with similar stories, we hope you will join in and share your stories with our community.

Junior Science - March 6



Speers Gallery

March Artist: Vera Piper

The Speers Gallery at the Kennebunk Free Library presents "It's Never Too Late!", an exhibition of botanical drawings and paintings by local resident Vera Piper. The exhibit runs March 1 – 31.

Vera Piper was born in 1940 in the hills of Western MD where she spent her childhood exploring the mountain woods with her sister, and later chose a career as a micro-biologist. Looking at tiny plants and animals under a microscope led Vera to develop a deep appreciation for all of the beautiful forms found in nature. Although she had every plant

identification book imaginable, she *never* thought she could learn draw the lovely plants she was collecting wherever she traveled.

Vera finally took her first drawing class in 2000 at age 60 on a whim, but it remained a part-time hobby until she relocated to Maine in 2018 at age 78 to be closer to her family, and began to develop an interest in expanding her art education. In 2021 she began to take a few classes locally to explore sketching and watercolors. The exhibit in Speers

Gallery is designed to show how, even in our 80s, we can continue to grow and change and take on new risks to express what we have nurtured through a lifetime. Vera hopes that sharing these drawings will inspire you to try your hand at something new, no matter your age!

Vera will be teaching a class in botanical drawing at The Center in Lower Village Kennebunk this spring. Kennebunk Free Library is please to display the works of this octogenarian artist.

The public is invited to view the exhibit in the library's Speers Gallery from March 1-31 at 112 Main St., Kennebunk, Maine during regular library hours when the gallery is not in use for library programs. A Message from the Library Director





Staff Picks & Messages

Kate, Cataloger

Quick! Name a zoo animal that starts with R! Red panda! River otter! Ring-tailed lem---Ohhh too late, time is up! In Last Word, players try to call out words that fit both the category and letter in play while a random-interval timer ticks down. If you are the last one to call out a word before the buzzer goes off, you get to move a space closer to home on the game board. This simple premise can lead to a lot of fun, and some silly arguments. Things got a little heated on our last play when our group, a mix of adults and kids, debated whether "ten tiny fish" counts for something you'd find in a can that starts with T (majority ruled no, giving the win to "tuna" as the acceptable last word). Last Word would be a good choice for players that enjoy fast paced word games like Catch Phrase or Scattergories. It can accommodate 2-8 players and is recommended for ages 8+. This and other games can be found by the adult circulation desk and in the Reading Room.

A Life in Light: Meditations on Impermanence by Mary Pipher

This memoir in essay form focusses on the light to be found even through

difficulties and loss. From her lonely childhood in the Midwest, to her experiences in college as she earns her degree in psychology, and as she builds a family, the author uses her experiences and expertise to explore our culture. Even though many of the topics are hard, I found the book gentle and relaxing to read.

Braiding Sweetgrass by Robin Wall Kimmerer

I am late to this party, so many patrons and coworkers have asked if I have read this. The audio version is available on our Overdrive account. The author reads it and it is a delight. She is a botanist, college professor, gardener and familiar with her native (Potawatomi) heritage. Her chapter about the three-sisters of beanscorn-squash from Native American Lore is fantastic. Having 3 daughters myself I enjoyed her description of the sisters working together using their strengths to support each other and help each of them grow. The author is a college professor and shares how she opens the eyes of medical students to the wonders of plant life. I could go on and on, loved this audio book, read by the author.

Mr. Malcolm's List directed by Emma Holly Jones

In 1800s England, a young woman sets her sites on a suitor unaware of his list of requirements for a wife. When she "fails" he doesn't seek her out anymore and she is publicly embarrassed by a newspaper caricature. Enraged, she invites her country friend to come and break his heart by fulfilling all the requirements and then dumping him. Parties, romance, beautiful clothes, and I was delighted by the whole silly thing.
