# **Gift Wrap Exchange**


### **New to Our Library of Things!**

Do you have incandescent light strings that annoyingly refuse to light up all the way? Or a collection of half-dead light strings collecting dust in your attic? KFL has a new tool for you! We recently added a LightKeeper Pro, a device that repairs incandescent light strings, extending their life, keeping them out of landfills, and lowering your holiday decorating stress! We tested the LightKeeper Pro on a string of half-dead lights and it worked like a charm and was easy to use. Simply pull out one of the unlit bulbs, plug the socket into the LightKeeper, pull the trigger, and see the dark bulbs illuminate. The tool works by sending a current through the light strand and repairing failed electrical shunts to the sockets. If any bulbs along the damaged strings are fully dead, you will be able to identify them for replacement, while remaining good bulbs stay lit. NOTE: The LightKeeper Pro only works for incandescent lights, including artificial trees pre-lit with incandescent bulbs. The tool is not designed for and will not work with any LED lights.

The LightKeeper Pro can be checked out to KFL cardholders for one week. We expect this may be a popular tool coming into the holiday season, so we encourage anyone interested in trying it to check it out as early as possible to get your incandescent lights ready for use.







### **Changes Coming to Kanopy**

Starting November 1, Kanopy will be moving away from its current model of play credits per patron to a ticket-based system. Instead of play credits, each user will now be given a monthly ticket allotment. Each title is given a ticket value based on running time; the ticket value will be displayed when you browse titles. KFL patrons will have 14 tickets per user per month. Content on Kanopy Kids will continue to be its own section and will not be included in the ticket system. 


spread and developed throughout the world. Please email or phone by November 18 to let us know of your interest.

# Seed Starting for Native Plants - November 14

Many native plants form seeds one year, drop or otherwise spread seeds, and those seeds spend the winter outside. Then the following spring, they germinate and grow into more native plants to provide sustenance and food sources for

many of our pollinators and wildlife.

On Tuesday, November 14 at 6:00, join a Master Gardner at KFL for a class that will replicate this natural phenomena, but under slightly more controlled circumstances. In this 2-hour class, participants will have the chance to choose 1-2 types from several varieties of native wildflowers, and pot up 1-2 4-inch pots to overwinter outside. They will learn how to watch for germination and growth, and how to divide the young seedlings for more pots to grow for their own gardens and/or plant sales to contribute to. The class will include potting soil, 4-inch pots, builders sand, a variety of native plant seeds, and ideas on how to overwinter the pots. A demonstration for using a distilled water jug as a mini greenhouse to

overwinter pots in will be given, for participants to try later.

The Master Gardeners will be discussing the importance of growing native plants in our home gardens, as well as encouraging the wider use of native plants in public gardens as well. All questions and ideas will be welcome.

Supplies will be provided but participants are asked to bring their own trowels. The library will have a few on hand, if needed. If you are more comfortable with garden gloves and an apron, please bring those as well. Space is very limited. Please register through the calendar on our website.

The Master Gardener teaching this program is Donna Gaylord, an amateur gardener for 50 years, and M.G. since 2021. She is also the Co-President of The Seacoast Garden Club, and after 50 years of all types of home gardening, realizes there is always more to learn! She will be helped by Master Gardener Beth Geary, another fantastic gardener!




# Thursday Family Fun Play - Beginning November 9

# STAFF PICKS

### Kate, Cataloger

At a recent get-together, we tried a game new to KFL's collection: Great Scott! Our youngest player (10) declared multiple times "this game is FUN!!" and the rest of us concur. Great Scott! combines the card passing play of Sushi Go with the storytelling of Balderdash or Superfight. Over three rounds, players build inventions by combining different attribute and concept cards in a certain order. Once built, players present their invention to the group, describing what it does and how it works. Once presentations are complete, commendations for the top two inventions are handed out. At the end of three rounds, points are calculated from a variety of sources: card values, commendations, and bonuses for alliteration and matching concepts. Our group was in fits of laughter learning all about our inventions like the Alarming Crab Detecting Calcite Airship, the Dependable Bauxite Bituminizing Banana Conqueror, and the Bedazzling Acorn Atomizing Dodo Detonator. KFL's copy includes an expansion deck that we did not try, but all were in agreement that this game will be added to our rotation, and we intend to try playing with the extra deck another time. Give Great Scott! a go and see what you might invent!



## **Kat, Substitute Library Assistant**

The Covenant of Water by Abraham Verghese

I loved the author's book *Cutting For Stone* and it was a long wait for this one but well worth it. Only IF you are someone that likes a detailed and rich study of culture and humanity AND can handle a slow pace. People either love it or hate it. I think what one person reads as lovely prose is another's boring slog and that is a deciding factor. The story takes place from 1900 to 1977 in Kerala, on South India's Malabar Coast. It follows three generations of a family plagued by what they refer to as "the condition" which causes each generation to lose at least one member to drowning. A Scottish doctor appears quite early in the story and adds a new dimension. I loved the characters and related to their struggles, joys, and pain. I wish it had gone on longer. (Available from KFL as a book, audio (read by the author) and on Libby.)

The Orchardist - Amanda Coplin

This is another title from KFL's adult book group. This well-crafted tale about life in the early 1900s in the Pacific Northwest pulls you in and keeps you captivated. The author shows us farming life, the struggles of family (both born and welcomed) and one of my favorite parts was the details of gentling wild mustangs for auction. The cycles of love, pruning and harvesting of the orchard and the sales heritage apples and apricots was beautiful to "see". I cared deeply for each of the characters and loathed the bad guy. (Available from KFL as a book and through Minerva as an audio on cd, large print and a book.)

Friends of KFL Museum Pass opportunity: The Ogunquit Museum of Art will close for the season on November 12<sup>th</sup>.

Free admission pass for four people is available each day for KFL patrons. I had wanted to go to this museum for years but never picked a day and just went! Finally, I did it in October. What a payoff waits for you on Shore Road in Ogunquit. The outside walks and sculpture, as well as the view of the ocean and Narrow Cove are worth the visit in themselves. Inside they have works by Rockwell Kent, the Zorachs and many other pieces to enjoy. Their temporary exhibits were wonderful! See for yourself!
