## KFL Accepting Artist Applications to Exhibit in 2026

The Kennebunk Free Library is currently accepting applications for artists to exhibit during the 2026 calendar year. Since its inception in 2001, the Speers Gallery has offered exhibit opportunities to both amateur and professional artists. The gallery has hosted a variety of mediums including photography, textile arts and mixed media assemblages in addition to renditions in oil, pastel, enamel oil, encaustic, pen and ink, and watercolor.

The application process is open to both individual and group shows. Applications must be received by Friday, October 17, 2025.

In November 2025, an art committee consisting of members from the Library and art communities will convene to review the completed applications and set a monthly exhibit schedule for 2026. Upon completion of the review, applicants will be contacted regarding the Committee's decisions.

## **Navigating Long Term Care Decisions - October 21**

Too many families feel trapped by emergency care decisions. On **Tuesday, October 21 at 5:30 p.m.**, Kaitlyn Cunningham Morse, founder of Maine Aging Partners, will speak about the idea of a "Second Retirement" — the stage of life after 75 when support needs rise and choices can't be ignored. She will share what "Second Retirement" is really about: facing long-term care with strength, standing on your own terms, and making choices before a crisis makes them for you. You'll see how long-term care actually works in Maine — and leave with the tools and confidence to define your choices instead of being defined by the system.

Kaitlyn Cunningham Morse is the founder of Maine Aging Partners, a consultancy that helps families face long-term care

### Camden Conference: Norman Olsen - October 27

The Kennebunk Free Library will host Norman Olsen on **Monday, October 27, 2025 at 6:00 p.m.**, a Camden Conference community event. Olsen will discuss from personal experience 34 years of deteriorating prospects for

Middle East peace.

Cape Elizabeth native Norm Olsen served for 26 years in the U.S. Foreign Service, with a total of nine years in Israel and the Gaza Strip. His first tour of duty, as a Gaza reporting officer and USAID representative, spanned the First Intifada, the Madrid talks, the secret Oslo negotiations, the establishment of the Palestinian Authority, and the return of Yasser Arafat to Palestine. His reporting during that time was recognized by his award of a National Human Intelligence Reporting Award from the U.S. intelligence community.


His second tour of duty, as chief of the embassy political section, spanned the Second Intifada, the efforts of Quartet negotiator James Wolfensohn, the Israeli withdrawal from Gaza, the victory of Hamas in U.S.-demanded Palestinian elections, the successful Hamas expulsion of U.S.-backed Fatah militants who were terrorizing Gaza, and the Israel-Lebanon war.

He retired as a Senior Foreign Service Officer in 2008 and has remained active in Israeli and Palestinian affairs. He and his wife, Pat, live in Cherryfield, Maine.

In twelve striking, luminescent stories, author Morgan Talty -- with searing humor, abiding compassion, and deep insight -- breathes life into tales of family and a community as they struggle with a painful past and an uncertain future. A collection that examines the consequences and merits of inheritance, Night of the Living Rez is an unforgettable portrayal of



an Indigenous community and marks the arrival of a standout talent in contemporary fiction. --Novelist

If during a session we determine that the issue requires more time than 10 minutes, we can schedule a 45-minute Tech Time appointment on Wednesday or Thursday, allowing for in-person, one-on-one assistance.

### **Kindness Crew - October 14**



#### Meet and Greet with Pete the Cat - October 16



# A Message from the Director



KFL is busy year-round, but things really ramp up during the summer months. I always enjoy reviewing statistics and want to share a small snapshot of these figures with you.

- Between June 18 and August 18, our calendar system estimates that we had 65 adult programs with 950 attendees.
- Among teens, kids, and babies, a total of 291 patrons signed up for the Summer Reading Program.
- The 28<sup>th</sup> Edition 5K had a net income of over \$70,000.
- · Our Technology Educator, Emmaline Bruce, provided 12 hours of one-on-one technology assistance in July.
- · 105 people signed up for a new library card in July.
- · In July, 6,539 items were checked out with an additional 958 renewals.

Fighting for yes!: the story of disability rights activist Judith Heumann by Maryann Cocca-Leffler; illustrated by Vivien Mildenberger; with a note from Judith Heumann

Imagine a world where people with disabilities are confined to homes and institutions because no provision has been made for their mobility, education or participation in society. Young Judy and her family were faced with these issues. Born in 1947 in Brooklyn, NY. Her mother advocated for years for her to go to school like her friends. Finally, when she was nine years old, she was accepted to the "Health Conservation" Public School. Her friends were not there because they were in the "regular" classrooms. Though she and her classmates were not being taught very much, she loved going to school and was thrilled to ride a bus for the first time. This was Judy and her mom's first success that eventually led to the passage of the Americans with disabilities act (ADA).
