In Stitches - October 6, 13, 20, 27



Nonfiction Book Group - October 19



Teen Gaming



A Message from the Library Director



It has now been one month since we opened the library for in-person browsing. It has been wonderful to see so many familiar faces come through the doors and many new ones as well. Your continued understanding of our new rules is very much appreciated especially on behalf of the safety of the staff and all of our community members.

As librarians, this is very new territory for us. We are used to meeting your needs and right now there are many things we can not do. We can't offer newspapers to read or even a room to read them in. We do not have computers for public use or regular programming. Possibly worst of all is your time limit of 30 minutes. This doesn't allow for casual browsing and discovery or conversation. This isn't the cordial arrangement we're used to and we don't like it.

There will be an end to all of this though and once we arrive we'll be all the better for it. Curbside pickup has been very popular and it seems like it is here to stay in some kind of capacity. Online programming will likely supplement our regular programming allowing for a wider array of speakers and a chance for those who can't travel to participate. We are a public library and we have adapted over the centuries and this is just the latest bump in our road.

Staff Picks & Messages

Maria, Children's Librarian

I recently read a book called *The Talk*, a juvenile non-fiction book edited by Wade Hudson and Cheryl Willis Hudson. The collection includes #OwnVoices authors and illustrators relating their experiences with "the talk" about what it means to be a person of color, and in so doing, highlights issues of race and identity. The collection includes essay, poetry, short story, letter, and illustration. Some contributors focus on their experiences with their children, some on their experiences as children, and some produce fictional narratives. All are deeply heartfelt and touching. I would recommend this as reading for all ages, and it's especially great to read and discuss as a family. Also, new on Netflix is the series *Bookmarks*. In short, 5-10 minute episodes, picture books written by Black authors are read by actors or the authors themselves. Works by Jacqueline Woodson, Grace Byers, and Shane Evans are featured, among others. The show is hosted by teen Marley Dias, creator of the #1000BlackGirlBooks movement. It's a fabulous way to introduce young readers to books by Black creators. Also, KFL owns nearly all the books featured if you want to take a closer look!

Three of my favorites are New Kid by Jerry Craft (I listened to the awesome full-cast audiobook adaptation of this graphic novel), Maybe He Just Likes You by Barbara Dee, and Other Words for Home by Jasmine Warga.

Movie suggestion: Yesterday is a light and fun story with a Beatle's soundtrack. A freak natural occurrence creates an unbelievable opportunity and Jack takes it to a new level of success. Ed Sheeran as himself, puts a great spin on the movie and Jack is faced with a dilemma.

Book suggestion: *The Answer Is . . .:* Reflections on My Life by Alex Trebek Every Jeopardy! lover wants more information of how our favorite became the host and person he is. Candid, short chapters named in the form of an answer to a question, of course, give the desired insight into Alex's mind about his childhood, learning lessons (including my personal favorite about humility), his loves and challenges. The book ends on a hopeful note without denying the reality of living with a cancer diagnosis.



Murder in the Maple Woods by Claire Ackroyd

This is a cozy mystery for those who also like a touch of profanity and dry humor in their books (also: GOOD DOGS). It follows competent and practical Simone as she finishes her yearly job as an organic certification inspector among the sugar camps along the Canadian border of Maine, only to get caught up in life on her uncle's camp as tragedy strikes. The mystery revolves less around what happened but in unravelling why.

Set among the sugar camps in the far northwest of Maine, the believable, well-realized characters made that area come alive to me in a way it had not before, as well as let me learn all sorts of things about an industry about which I am only peripherally aware. It moves at a leisurely pace, but I honestly didn't care at all because I just wanted to spend time with these characters. I thoroughly enjoyed this book, and would recommend it to those who like a cozy mystery but not a (no pun intended) syrupy sweet one.
