Adult Book Discussion—With a Twist

The ongoing adult book discussion group at KFL will be treated to a discussion of the book, *Museum of Human Beings*, with author Colin Sargent participating, on **Friday**, **September 24**, **2010 at 11 AM**. A Portland native and founding editor of *Portland Magazine* in 1985, Colin Sargent and his book have been featured both on MPBN with Keith Shortall and WCSH's program 207. Sargent is a playwright and author of three books of poetry; a graduate of the United States Naval Academy, he has been awarded the Maine individual artist fellowship in literature and earned a Stonecoast MFA in creative writing. His screenplay *Montebello Ice* is under option at Gideon Films.



Published in 2008 by McBook's Press, Sargent's book *Museum of Human Beings* received great reviews. *Publishers Weekly* wrote "Playwright Sargent's debut novel is a stylish look at the fate of Sacagawea's baby son, Jean Baptiste Charbonneau... An impressively rounded portrait of the laid-back, introspective, nomadic Baptiste, this novel will satisfy fans of American history." *Museum of Human Beings* also earned a star review in *Library Journal*. "Spellbinding." Amazon.com writes, "There's so much to recommend this book. Fans of American historicals such as James Thom or Allan Eckert will definitely enjoy this, but so would fans of T. C. Boyle or William Vollmann or Wayne Johnston as well. Literate historical Americana—what a treat!"

Please join us for a lively discussion. Copies of his book are available to borrow, and Sargent will bring additional copies for signing and purchase. The adult book discussion group meets regularly on the fourth Thursday of the month at 11:15 AM. 
Gail Vistein, a conservation biologist practicing in Maine, will present "Coyote ~ America's Songdog", an interactive and visual presentation at the KFL on
