Summer Reading Rocked!

Thank you all for making summer reading so much fun! We held more than 65 summer programs between June 25 and August 17. When you add in our recurring programs (like In Stitches and Tech Time) that's 94 programs over the summer!

Registrations for our children's Summer Reading Program climbed to 177. To date, 36 kids have completed the program and collected their free book. About 277 scratch tickets were given out to teens for attending a program or checking out a book. They won buttons, books, candy, or were entered into four grand prize raffles. Fifty-seven adults entered to win 4 gift cards to local businesses. The entries came along with some insightful book reviews.


Summer reading rocked but we think that fall will be just as exciting!

Genealogy Group - September 8 The Soldier in the Pantalons Rouges

A presentation on Saturday, September 8 at 10:00 a.m. kicks off the eighth year of the Kennebunk Free Library's Genealogy Group. This lecture by Francine Keating and Pam Stone Eagleson, CG tells the story of Keating's paternal great grandfather Joseph Eugene Brent whose oil-colored tin-type image was given to her five decades ago by her Dad's second cousin. It is that picture which held clues that led to documenting family oral history and Joseph's ancestry.

Keating, owner of a small herb business for 45 years in Kennebunk, grew up in western Massachusetts where she developed an interest in her roots as her parents recounted oral family history. Eagleson, an associate of the Board for Certification of Genealogists and member of the Association of Professional Genealogists, is a researcher, writer, and lecturer.



Nonfiction Book Group - September 10

Join us on Monday, September 10 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Home That Was Our Country: A Memoir of Syria* by Alia Malek.

Born in Baltimore to Syrian refugee parents, Malek is an award-winning author (A Country Called Amreeka), journalist, and civil rights lawyer. While her original intent was to trace her family's history over the course of the last century, what Malek has produced is a valuable collection of stories of Christians, Jews, Muslims, Armenians, and Kurds as they interacted in Syria since the waning days of the Ottoman Empire in the late 19th century. Based on her own travels, the

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narrative recounts the fate of her ancestral home through her final departure in 2013. Readers will be moved by the insights and analysis included here: her own alienation as an Arab living in

the "provincial" suburbs of America, the difficulties of traveling as an unmarried woman in a Muslim country, and the struggles among the different ideologically driven political parties that have scarred her homeland. Most poignant is her concluding query: How can Syria ever emerge again, let alone prosper? While she gives no answers, her powerful story will cause thoughtful readers to pause and ponder. VERDICT Using scholarly sources in English and Arabic, Malek's extremely timely and highly readable narrative humanizes one of today's most complex political tragedies and will intrigue readers interested in current world affairs. --Marie M. Mullaney (Library Journal, vol 142, issue 01, p106)




The library has a limited number of ukuleles available. Please let us know if you will need to borrow one. We will do our best to accommodate you.

Adult Book Discussion - September 25

Join us on Tuesday, September 25 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Essex Serpent* by Sarah Perry.

"In Perry's (After Me Comes the Flood) excellent second novel, set in the Victorian era, recent widow Cora Seaborne leaves London with her 11-year-old son, Francis, and loyal companion, Martha, and goes to Colchester, where a legendary, fearsome creature called the Essex Serpent has been sighted. Scholarly Cora, who is more interested in the study of nature than in womanly matters of dress, tramps about in a man's tweed coat, determined to find proof of this creature's existence. Through friends, she is introduced to William



Ransome, the local reverend; his devoted wife, Stella; and their three children. Cora looks for a scientific rationale for the Essex Serpent , while Ransome dismisses it as superstition. This puts them at odds with one another, but, strangely, also acts as a powerful source of attraction between them. When Cora is visited by her late husband's physician, Luke Garrett, who carries a

not-so-secret torch for her, a love triangle of sorts is formed. In the end, a fatal illness, a knife-wielding maniac, and a fated union with the Essex Serpent will dictate the ultimate happiness of these characters. Like John Fowles's The French Lieutenant's Woman, whose Lyme Regis setting gets a shout-out here, this is another period literary pastiche with a contemporary overlay. Cora makes for a fiercely independent heroine around whom all the other characters orbit." (Publishers Weekly, vol 264, issue 16)



Let's Talk About It: Race and Justice in America

The Kennebunk Free Library has been selected by the Maine Humanities Council to offer "Let's Talk About It," a free reading and discussion group with copies of books available through the library. This program is provided by the Maine Humanities Council's Maine Center for the Book in cooperation with the Maine State Library.

The series "Race and Justice in America," begins on Tuesday, October 2, 2018 at 6:00 p.m., with sessions every two weeks until November 27. The series will be facilitated by Dr. Leroy M. Rowe of USM. Professor Rowe's research and teaching interests focus on the social and political experiences of African Americans during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.



Books to be read and discussed in this series are Contempt of Court: The Turn-of-the-Century Lynching that Launched a Hundred Years of Federalism by Mark Curriden and Leroy Phillips, Jr.; Arc of Justice: A Saga of Race, Civil Rights, and Murder in the Jazz Age by Kevin Boyle; The Contested Murder of Latasha Harlins: Justice, Gender, and the Origins of the LA Riots by Brenda Stevenson; Just Mercy: A Story of Redemption by Bryan Stevenson; and The Fire This Time: A New Generation Speaks About Race by Jesmyn Ward.


Crafternoon - September 19

Of all the ships in history, few have captured our imagination like the ill-fated Titanic. The largest ship in the world when completed in 1912, it famously sank after hitting


an iceberg on its maiden voyage, becoming one of the deadliest peacetime shipwrecks in history.


Last Month to Use CMNH Pass
