




# Nonfiction Book Group - September 9

Join us on Monday, September 9 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Our Beloved Kin* by Lisa Brooks.

In this dense and ambitious account of the 17th-century conflicts



known as King Philip's War, Brooks (The Common Pot), associate professor of English and American studies at Amherst College, recovers histories of Native American adaptation and resistance to settler colonialism. Tracking the figures of Weetamoo, a female Wampanoag chief, and James Printer, a Nipmuc scholar and printer, Brooks unveils new archival material as well as alternative histories embedded within well-known colonial documents-including Mary Rowlandson's captivity narrative, in which both Weetamoo and Printer appear. Though historians have portrayed Native Americans as outside the world of print, Brooks close reads materials such as land deeds to show that indigenous people engaged in "strategic adaptations" to colonial culture, making canny use of written documents to protect ancestral lands and confront white settlers. Reading key texts through the lens of geography and tribal history, Brooks reframes King Philip's War as a complex set of stories about



indigenous persistence. With so much material to analyze, Brooks sometimes struggles to untangle narrative threads, and her use of historical fiction to represent indigenous voices tends to confuse rather than enrich her scenes. Nonetheless, Brooks's project provides a wealth of information for both scholars and lay readers interested in Native American history. (Publishers Weekly, vol 264, issue 48, p)



# Adult Book Discussion - September 24

Join us on Tuesday, September 24 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine* by Gail Honeyman.

Move over, Ove (in Fredrik Backman's A Man Called Ove, 2014)-there's a new curmudgeon to love. Thirty-year-old Eleanor Oliphant leads a highly predictable life, working at an office, eating the same meals alone in her apartment, and spending her weekends regularly administering vodka (she usually goes without speaking to another human from the time she bids farewell to the bus driver on Friday until she greets another one on Monday). She is, as she regularly tells



herself, fine. But when a chance encounter with a local musician sends her reeling into the throes of a full-fledged crush, her carefully constructed world breaks open. Soon she is embarking on a self-improvement program from the outside in, complete with shopping trips, manicure, makeup, and attempts at hairstyling. The real changes, however, are slowly taking place within, as she develops a friendship with a man from work and eventually learns the wonderful rewards that come to those who open their hearts. Walking in Eleanor's practical black Velcro shoes is delightfully amusing, her prudish observations leavened with a privately puckish humor. But readers will also be drawn in by her tragic backstory, which slowly reveals how she came to be so entirely Eleanor. Witty, charming, and heartwarming, Eleanor Oliphant Is Completely Fine is a remarkable debut about a singular woman. Readers will cheer Eleanor as she confronts her dark past and turns to a brighter future. Feel good without feeling smarmy.

# Windows and Mirrors Book Club - September 23



## September Artist: Patricia Wooldridge

We are pleased to announce our September 2019 exhibition, "Capturing Life in Pencil, Pen & Brush," the mixed media works of Patricia R. Wooldridge. The public is invited to view the exhibit during regular library hours when the gallery is not in use for library programs.

Patty, born in Buxton, has lived in Maine most of her life. At age seven she began drawing, using the Sunday comics as models.



Soon, thrilled by her mom's sketches and stories of life on the farm in Dayton where all the heavy work was done by horses, she focused on - what else - horses. And so she drew.

She continually asked for a pony, which was not forthcoming, so she built a horse from four pine slabs, a short log, and a piece of strapping for its neck. That horse was in use for quite some time.

Meanwhile, the drawing continued through weekly art lessons in grade school and high school. Patty discovered the work of C.W. Anderson, Wesley Dennis and George Ford Morris. If only she could draw like that! Little did she know, she already was drawing like Sam Savitt, the illustrator

of the horse comic books that inspired her. She learned that recently by reading his obituary.

After high school graduation, Patty took a couple of adult education painting courses in watercolor and oil. Horses as a subject were not highly regarded by the instructors. Horses appeared anyway, along with the required landscapes and ocean scenes.

In the 1990s, she began working from her own photos taken at fairs, horse shows, and private stables and barns. Many of the resulting drawings were done as commissioned work.

This exhibit includes horses in varied aspects: from showgirls and ploughboys to dressage. Horses and barns go together; several rustic barns are included in this viewing.

The public is invited to attend an artist's reception on Friday, September 13 during Kennebunk ArtTrail from 3:00 to 5:00 PM. The Kennebunk Free Library is pleased and honored to be able to present the works of this talented artist.

# **Use Your Library Card in Other Libraries**

Beginning at the end of the month, we will be working with the Maine State Library and more than 60 public and university libraries to offer a year-long pilot of a statewide reciprocal borrowing program. What does that mean, exactly? Once the program begins (the target date is September 16), you will be able to visit any one of the participating libraries and use your KFL library card to borrow books, audio books, and movies. Is there a book at USM that you need right away? Rather than waiting for it to arrive through interlibrary loan, you'll be able to drive up to Portland and pick it up. Did you finish your audio book on your drive up to Mount Desert Island? You'll be able to walk into a library on the island to borrow a new one. Once the program launches, we will provide a complete list of libraries from around the state that will honor your KFL cards.

Right now, this program is a trial run. Libraries will be gathering data and seeking feedback from users. If it proves successful, there's a possibility that the program could become permanent and grow to include even more libraries.

# A Message from the Library Director

We appreciate your in-kind contributions of all types. These primarily include books, DVDs, and audiobooks that KFL can then use to raise money during our ongoing and quarterly book sales or sometimes add to our collection. These donations can also include other items as approved and accepted by staff. When we started accepting donations again after our July book sale though we were inundated with materials that we just couldn't use such as dictionaries from the 50s and 70s that are significantly outdated, yellowed, and take up a lot of real estate. We also received paper bags full of VHS tapes and boxes brimming to the top with poor quality books that required the help of two people to move with a hand truck. In these cases donations hurt Kennebunk Free Library more than they help us. They can't be sold or stored and take up staff and



volunteer time as well as put us at risk of injury with boxes of excessive weights. Because we can't keep these kinds of materials they also fill the space of our trash and recycling cans.

KFL has a very generous community and as such, <u>our donation guidelines</u> help us fit our space and time contraints. We ask that you please respect our criteria.
