
In Stitches - September 6, 13, 20, 27


Reader's Choice Book Club - September 12

Nonfiction Book Group - September 12



Join us on Monday, September 12 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *All That She Carried* by Tiya Miles.

"Miles illuminates the lives of three generations of Black American women via a patched and embroidered cotton sack now displayed in the National Museum of African American History and Culture. Rose, an enslaved woman in South Carolina, filled the sack with what provisions and keepsakes she could for her 9-year-old daughter Ashley, who was sold away from her in the 1850s. Years later, Ashley's granddaughter Ruth embroidered a narrative of the family history on the sack. From these small clues, Miles delves into Black Americans' experience of slavery, Reconstruction, Jim Crow segregation, and the Great Migration.

With skillful writing, the author carefully explores South Carolina's history of economic dependence on slavery, and discusses the efforts of enslaved people to obtain sustenance and clothing and maintain family connections. Drawing on scant genealogical records and letters from people who were formerly enslaved, as well as research on ornamentation, Miles creates a moving account of three women whose stories might have otherwise been lost to history. VERDICT Readers interested in often-overlooked lives and experiences, and anyone who cherishes a handcrafted heirloom, will enjoy this fascinating book. With YA crossover appeal, the accessible, personal writing sets this book apart." (Library Journal, vol 146, issue 6, p126)

Scottish Prisoners in Colonial Maine - September 20



Not all of Maine's earliest European settlers came voluntarily. On Tuesday, September 20 at 6:00, Carol Gardner will deliver a talk at the Kennebunk Free Library entitled "Involuntary Americans: Scottish Prisoners in Early Colonial Maine," discussing the more than 400 prisoners of war who were brought to Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts against their wills in 1650-1651. Dr. Gardner is the author of a narrative history, *The Involuntary American: A Scottish Prisoner's Journey to the New World*.

Carol Gardner has more than 30 years' experience as a writer, journalist and communicator. She earned a Ph.D. in English

from Johns Hopkins University, taught at Johns Hopkins, Wake Forest, and Florida State Universities, and has published both fiction and nonfiction pieces in a wide variety of books and periodicals, including the *World of Baseball*, *BluePlanet Quarterly*, *Northwest Review*, *Baltimore Review*, *Potomac Review*, *The Women's Review of Books*, *Portland Press Herald*, and *The Washington Post*. She is a past winner of a Maryland Individual Artists Award. She lives in Alna, Maine.

Adult Book Discussion - September 27



Join us on Tuesday, September 27 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *Hamnet* by Maggie O'Farrell.

"Imagining the life of the family Shakespeare left behind in Stratford makes an intriguing change of pace for a veteran storyteller.

While O'Farrell eschews the sort of buried-secrets plots that drive the propulsive narratives of such previous novels as *Instructions for a Heatwave* (2013), her gifts for full-bodied characterization and sensitive rendering of intricate family bonds are on full display. She opens with 11-year-old Hamnet anxiously hovering over his twin sister, Judith, who has a mysterious fever and ominous swellings.

When Hamnet asks his grandfather where his mother is, the old man strikes him, and as the novel moves through the characters' memories, we see the role John Shakespeare's brutality played in son Will's departure for London. The central figure in this drama is Shakespeare's wife, Agnes, better known to history as Anne, recipient of the infamous second-best-bed bequest in his will. O'Farrell chooses an alternate name—spelling was not uniform in Elizabethan times—and depicts Agnes as a woman whose profound engagement with the natural world drew young Will to her from their first meeting. The daughter of a reputed sorceress, Agnes has a mysterious gift: She can read people's natures and foresee their futures with a single touch. She sees the abilities within Will that are being smothered as a reluctant Latin tutor and inept participant in his father's glove trade, and it is Agnes who deftly maneuvers John into sending him away. She believes she will join Will soon, but Judith's frailty forestalls this. O'Farrell draws us into Agnes' mixed emotions as the years go by and she sees Will on his increasingly infrequent visits 'inhabiting it—that life he was meant to live, that work he was intended to do.' Hamnet's death—bitterly ironic, as he was always the stronger twin—drives the couple farther apart, and news of a new play called Hamlet sends Agnes to London in a rage. O'Farrell's complex, moving finale shows her watching the performance and honoring her husband's ability to turn their grief into art.

Chill Gaming - September 1, 15, and 23





Distant Shores by Kristin Hannah

This was my summer read. My daughter handed it to me after she finished it and enjoyed it. A couple struggles to find the passion in their marriage once the kids launch into their own lives. I related to the woman as she worked to revitalize the things she loved to do before marriage and family took the place of earlier loves. Her handsome ex-football player husband spends his time and efforts to rekindle his fabulous career that was taken away due to injury and a struggle with pain medication addiction. Of course, there is no lack of a woman interested in making him feel good about himself. A good story told well.

The Giver of Stars by Jojo Moyes

Alice Wright leaves England and marries American Bennet Van Cleave and joins him to live in a Kentucky mining town. Finding her new life claustrophobic, Alice jumps at the chance to become a travelling librarian. The story takes us into the homes of miners and rural families living in poverty. The librarians are faced with many challenges but also the joy of putting books into the hands of men, women and children that have never had that privilege before.

The author does of great job of helping us understand the difficulties of the 1930's south.

This work of historical fiction is based on a true story of America's past. Eleanor Roosevelt championed the traveling libraries as part of FDR's New Deal during the depression.

The School for Good Mothers by Jessamin Chan

Take this book out if you are interested in a dystopian Department of Human Services story with an artificial intelligence twist.
